

At SchoolTime, students are guaranteed a live arts experience that will capture their interest and awaken their curiosity. Peking Acrobats



Mon, Jan 26, 11 am and 1:30 pm Tues, Jan 27, 11 am

What is possible when the human body can do more than we imagine?

The Peking Acrobats, China's most gifted company of tumblers, contortionists, jugglers, and gymnasts, return with daring maneuvers rooted in 2,000 years of folk tradition. Rigorously trained since childhood, these artists dazzle audiences with skill and agility, performing feats on moving bicycles, jumping hoops, balancing precariously, and executing perfectly choreographed aerial acts. Musicians playing Chinese folk instruments are an integral part of the performance.

Kodo

How do taiko drummers communicate and create community through the power of their rhythms?

Kodo evokes the "primal power and bravura beauty" (Chicago Tribune) of Japanese taiko drumming, combining the dramatic traditions of this ancient art form with an exciting modern flair. The young drummers, who have collaborated with artists as diverse as Blue Man Group, Cirque de Soleil, and composer Tan Dun, marshal thunderous drums with thrilling precision and musical grace. "Kodo can raise the roof, but the group can also show extraordinary finesse" (The New York Times).

The Nile Project

Fri, Feb 20, 11 am

How does The Nile Project use music to strengthen cultural ties, raise environmental awareness, and alleviate conflict?

Using the power of making music together, musicians and vocalists from the countries of the Nile Basin, including Sudan, Egypt, Eritrea, Ethiopia, and Uganda, raise awareness of the cultural and environmental challenges along the world's longest river. The result is the new sound of a shared Nile identity. Their stirring performance, like their debut album Aswan (one of NPR's "5 Must Hear International Albums") features songs in a dozen languages and a wide range of traditional instruments.



Cal Performances in the Classroom

What happens when you invite Cal Performances into your classroom? You get our multi-step arts integration program, designed to situate you and your students squarely in the space where the rigor of artistic inquiry and the practice of good teaching and learning flow together naturally.

Every SchoolTime performance includes resource materials for teachers to engage their students before and following each performance. For three of these performances—Kodo, The Nile Project, and Alvin Ailey American Dance **Theater**—professional development workshops give teachers hands-on, experiential explorations of the upcoming performance, each associated with optional classroom visits from expert Teaching Artists. We will engage your imagination through the art form, share investigations into the questions that motivate the artists, and seek creative connections between the performance and the world around us. Art never happens in a vacuum—the more you know and understand about an art form, the more you can participate authentically as a viewer and a partner in the artistic experience.

Teacher workshops take place at Longfellow Middle School, 1500 Derby Street in Berkeley, and cost \$40. Classroom visits are \$70 and are scheduled following workshop participation.

This year, we are piloting an experimental, limited Three-Visit Residency program associated with the **Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater** SchoolTime performance. Workshop participants can select a single classroom visit, as seen above (\$70), or the new Three-Visit option (\$150). A Teaching Artist will come to your classroom once before your students attend SchoolTime, then twice following the performance.

Creativity, Arts and Learning: Common Core in the Classroom

Sat, Sept 27, 9:30 am-4 pm, Longfellow Middle School

The arts are an essential tool for deeply engaged teaching and learning in the common core framework. Cal Performances and Berkeley Unified School District's Office of Visual and Performing Arts invite you to an interactive day of training to explore live performing arts as a rich resource for sparking your own creativity and inspiring your students to investigate the world around them

Subject Areas: Music, Social Studies, Japanese History

How do taiko drummers communicate and create community through the power of their rhythms?

Discover how taiko drums "speak" to call community together. This dynamic workshop investigates the sensory rhythms rooted in the ancient art of taiko drumming, as well as taiko's role in Japanese myth, culture, and art.

Participants may request a single classroom visit from a trained *taiko* teaching artist.

Bridging Cultures Through Music

Sat, Jan 31, 10 am-1 pm

Subject Areas: Music, Social Studies, Environmental Science, Language Arts

How does the Nile Project use music to strengthen cultural ties, raise environmental awareness, and alleviate conflict?

Delve into the remarkable landscape of East Africa's Nile Basin, in a model of musical collaboration between people of 11 countries that are frequently in conflict—including Egypt, Ethiopia, Sudan—that sets the stage to tackle sometimes extreme cultural and environmental competing interests. In this workshop, you will make music; examine the interplay of geography, resources, and culture; and brainstorm big ideas around food security, shared resources, and the power of artistic interaction.

Participants may request a single classroom visit from a music teaching artist.

The Music of Revelations

Subject Areas: Dance, Music, Social Studies, Language Arts

How do the choreography and spirituals in Alvin Ailey's Revelations evoke the emotional resonance of American experience?

In his classic work, *Revelations*, Alvin Ailey created rich visual poetry through movement, giving voice to the deep emotions rooted in his "blood memories." In this workshop, you will explore the evocative spirituals and enter the crucible of American history that inspired and still propels *Revelations*.

Participants may request a single classroom visit, or apply to participate in the limited Three-Visit Residency program.




