Mark Morris was born on August 29, 1956, in Seattle, Washington, where he studied as a young man with Verla Flowers and Perry Brunson. Early in his career, he performed with Lar Lubovitch, Hannah Kahn, Laura Dean, Eliot

Feld and the Koleda Balkan Dance Ensemble. He formed the Mark Morris Dance Group in 1980, and has since created more than 120 works for the company. From 1988 to 1991, he was Director of Dance at the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie in Brussels, the national opera house of Belgium. Among the works created during his tenure were three evening-length dances: The Hard Nut; L'Allegro, il Penseroso ed il Moderato; and Dido and Aeneas. In 1990, he founded the White Oak Dance Project with Mikhail Baryshnikov. Morris is also much in demand as a ballet choreographer. He has created seven works for the San Francisco Ballet since 1994 and received commissions from American Ballet Theatre and the Boston Ballet, among others. His work is also in the repertory of the Pacific Northwest Ballet, Dutch National Ballet, New Zealand Ballet, Houston Ballet, English National Ballet and The Royal Ballet. Mr. Morris is noted for his musicality and has been described as "undeviating in his devotion to music." He has worked extensively in opera, directing and choreographing productions for the Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, English National Opera and The Royal Opera, Covent Garden. Mr. Morris was named a Fellow of the MacArthur Foundation in 1991. He has received nine honorary doctorates to date. In 2006, Mr. Morris received the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs Mayor's Award for Arts & Culture and a WQXR Gramophone Special Recognition Award. He is the subject of a biography by Joan Acocella (Farrar, Straus & Giroux) and Marlowe & Company published a volume of photographs and critical essays entitled Mark Morris' L'Allegro, il Penseroso ed il Moderato: A Celebration. Mr. Morris is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Philosophical Society. In 2007, he

received the Samuel H. Scripps/American Dance Festival lifetime achievement award.

The Mark Morris Dance Group (MMDG) was formed in 1980 and gave its first concert that year in New York City. The company's touring schedule steadily expanded to include cities both in the United States and in Europe, and in 1986 it made its first national television program for the PBS series Dance in America. In 1988, MMDG was invited to become the national dance company of Belgium, and spent three years in residence at the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie in Brussels. The company returned to the United States in 1991 as one of the world's leading dance companies, performing across the United States and at major international festivals. Based in Brooklyn, New York, the company has maintained and strengthened its ties to several cities around the world, most notably its West Coast home, Cal Performances, and its Midwest home, the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts in Urbana, Illinois. MMDG also appears regularly in New York City; Boston; Fairfax, Virginia; Seattle; and at the Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival in Becket, Massachusetts. MMDG made its debut at the Mostly Mozart Festival in 2002 and at the Tanglewood Music Festival in 2003 and has since been invited to both festivals annually. The company's London seasons have garnered two Laurence Olivier Awards. MMDG is noted for its commitment to live music, a feature of every performance on its full international touring schedule since 1996. MMDG collaborates with leading orchestras, opera companies, and musicians including cellist Yo-Yo Ma in the Emmy Award-winning film Falling Down Stairs (1997); Indian composer Zakir Hussain, Mr. Ma and jazz pianist Ethan Iverson in Kolam (2002); The Bad Plus in Violet Cavern (2004); pianists Emanuel Ax, Garrick Ohlsson and Yoko Nozaki for Mozart Dances (2006); and with the English National Opera in Four Saints in Three Acts (2000) and King Arthur (2006), among others. MMDG's film and television projects also include Dido and Aeneas, The Hard Nut and two documentaries for the UK's South Bank Show. In fall 2001, MMDG opened the Mark Morris Dance Center in Brooklyn, New York, housing rehearsal space for the dance community, outreach programs for

local children, as well as a school offering dance classes to students of all ages. For more information, visit www.mmdg.org.

The MMDG Music Ensemble formed in 1996, performs with the Dance Group at home and on tour and has become integral to the company's creative life. The core group, supplemented by musicians from a large roster of regular guests, has helped the Dance Group achieve an unprecedented streak of close to 800 performances with live music. The Ensemble's repertory ranges from 17th-century works by John Wilson and Henry Purcell to more recent scores by Lou Harrison and Henry Cowell. The Ensemble also presents concerts at the Mark Morris Dance Center and other venues, and participates in the Mark Morris Dance, Music and Literacy Project in the New York City public school system.



Pianist Colin Fowler hails from Kansas City, Kansas, and began studying piano at age five. After attending Interlochen Arts Academy, he received his bachelor's and master's degrees at The Julliard School, where he studied organ

with Gerre Hancock and piano with Abbey Simon. He has played and directed music across the country at venues including Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Jazz at Lincoln Center and the Library of Congress. Mr. Fowler has also performed with the American Brass Quintet, Deborah Voight, James Galway and at many of the churches and synagogues in New York. His Broadway credits include the recent revival of 42nd Street and the current production of the Tony Award-winning musical, Jersey Boys. He is chair of the Theory and Ear Training department at Nyack College, where he is a full-time professor and conductor of the Nyack College Chorale. Mr. Fowler has played with the MMDG Music Ensemble since 2006.



Violinist Cordelia Hagmann appears frequently as a chamber musician, recitalist and concertmistress in Europe and the United States. She won a top prize and the audience prize at the Chesapeake Chamber Music Competition

in 2004 with the Moirae Trio, the Kiwanis Prize in Zürich in 2001, the concerto competition in Winterthur in 1998 and other prestigious scholarships in her native Switzerland. As a soloist, she has performed with orchestras such as the Musikkollegium Winterthur and the Temple Symphony Orchestra, performing works by Bach, Beethoven, Chausson, Dvořák, Mozart, Sarasate, Saint-Saëns and Vivaldi. Ms. Hagmann began playing the violin at age five with Matthias Steiner in Switzerland. She continued her studies at the conservatory in Winterthur-Zürich with Nora Chastain (B.M. with honors) and Rudolf Koelman. In 2002, she moved to the United States, where she completed her studies with a performer diploma under Miriam Fried at Indiana University in Bloomington. While in Indiana, Ms. Hagmann was a member of the Moirae Piano Trio under the guidance of Menahem Pressler, founding member of the Beaux Arts Trio. Ms. Hagmann has lived in New York City since 2004, where she plays with MMDG, the Onyx Chamber Group, the String Orchestra of New York City and the American Symphony Orchestra, among others, and performs regularly as concertmistress of the New England Symphonic Ensemble in Carnegie Hall. She is on the violin faculty at Lucy Moses School and Opus 118, Harlem School of Music, and teaches chamber music for "New York Youth."



Since moving to New York in 1991, cellist **Wolfram Koessel** has established himself as a much sought after chamber musician, soloist, recording artist and contractor in the New York music scene. He

has performed with MMDG since 1999 and was music director from 2004 to 2008. In 2006, Mr. Koessel joined the world renowned American String Quartet, with which he performs in the foremost concert halls throughout the world, collaborating frequently with today's leading artists. Mr. Koessel appears with a wide range of ensembles and groups, most notably and frequently with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. He has supervised and performed music for Warner Brothers, American Express and many independent film companies besides organizing hundreds of classical orchestra and chamber music concerts in New York during the last decade. He is on the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music and the Aspen Music Festival. Mr. Koessel resides with his wife, pianist and writer J. Mae Barizo, in Manhattan.



Violist **Jessica Troy**, a native New Yorker, wears a wide variety of freelance hats. As the violist of the Mark Morris Dance Group Music Ensemble since 1998, she has toured extensively, from Brooklyn to Sydney,

and performed throughout the United States and Japan with Yo-Yo Ma. On the baroque viola, she performs with the Dodd String Quartet, Four Nations Ensemble, Rebel, Grand Tour Orchestra, Sinfonia NY, Clarion and a fun feather in this cap, and has appeared with Renée Fleming on Late Night with David Letterman. She has seized the stage from Toronto to Lima with the East Village Opera Company, a rock group (without appropriate headgear). She is a member of both the Brooklyn and Westchester philharmonics. Wearing headphones, she has recorded quartet parts for Ani DiFranco, Lou Reed, 2 Foot Yard and Charming Hostess. A participant at many illustrious chamber music festivals, including Prussia Cove and Marlboro, she can be heard on the latter's 50th anniversary CD in György Kurtág's Microludes for string quartet, which she prepared with the composer.



Described in *Gramophone* as an "alluring soloist [with] heightened expressive and violinistic gifts," violinist **Michi Wiancko** has performed with orchestras including the New York and Los Angeles philharmonics,

and in recital and chamber appearances across the nation. Ms. Wiancko made her New York solo recital debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall after winning the 2002 Concert Artists Guild International Competition. She was featured as an "artist to watch" on the cover of the January 2007 Symphony magazine. She has toured extensively throughout the country as soloist, recitalist and chamber musician, and has appeared in venues such as the Kennedy Center, Sydney Opera House, Metropolitan Museum of Art, National Gallery, Library of Congress, New York Town Hall and Philadelphia Chamber Music Society. Ms. Wiancko has toured with Musicians from Marlboro and the Los Angeles Piano Quartet. In March 2007, she gave the world premiere of a concerto written for her by Margaret Brouwer, which she performed with Cleveland's CityMusic Orchestra. Ms. Wiancko is also the singer and songwriter for her Kono Michi project, comprising string quartet, upright bass and drums. Kono Michi has performed in Merkin Hall, Symphony Space's Thalia Theater, Brooklyn's BAM Café and Barbès and the World Café Live in Philadelphia. Her self-produced debut album of original music, titled 9 Death Haiku, has recently been released. A native of Southern California, Ms. Wiancko began her violin studies at age three. She continued her studies with Donald Weilerstein at the Cleveland Institute of Music and completed her master's degree at The Juilliard School, working with Robert Mann.
