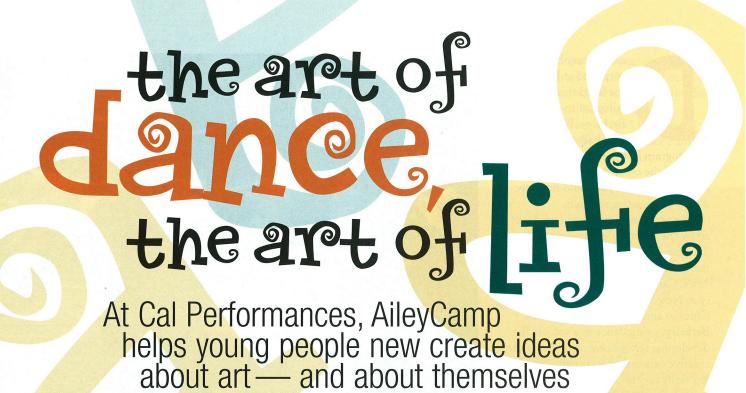








At CalPerformances, AileyCamp helps young people creative new ideas about art— and themselves.

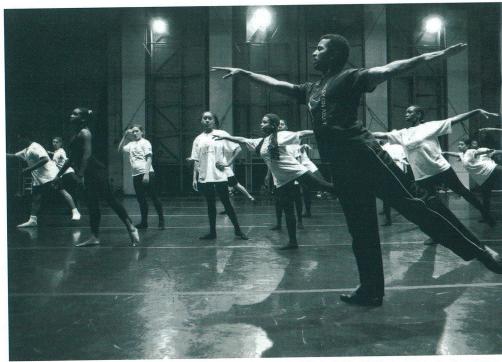

ezanik may have been surprised at how much she liked this summer's AileyCamp at UC-Berkeley. But anyone who had experienced the program last year in Berkeley-or at any of the other AileyCamp sites around the country—could have predicted her positive reaction.

The program, conceived and directed by the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, has been winning fans around the country since it was founded in 1989. Camps have operated successfully in New York, Kansas City, Boston, Chicago and Bridgeport, as well as Berkeley, using dance as a vehicle for developing self-esteem, self-discipline, creative expression and critical thinking skills for children who are in the tender and perilous years of middle school.

The AileyCamp curriculum includes daily technique classes in bal-



let, Horton-based modern dance, jazz and West African dance. There are

classes in performance technique and creative communication to deepen the students' awareness of their potential for self-expression. And personal development classes provide counseling in nutrition, conflict resolution, drug abuse prevention, decision-making and goal-setting.

AileyCamp targets students with academic, social and domestic challenges— criteria that often determine a child's risk of dropping out of school—but the program also welcomes students who have little opportunity to develop their artistic interests. An important aspect of the program's success lies in providing positive adult and peer role models for underserved youths. At the end of camp, students leave with valuable life skills and a sense of accomplishment before they enter the challenging high school years.

The Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp at Cal Performances is the first West Coast site of the program, and the first on a university campus. The program is held in Zellerbach Hall and adjacent buildings on the UC Berkeley campus, providing a positive experience in a university setting.

"AilevCamp has taken a prominent place in Cal Performances' Education and Community Programs by provid-

ing a multi-discipline dance-immersion experience for young people, conducted by a company of the highest artistic integrity," says Stephanie Scott, who is Cal Performances' public relations associate.

The Berkely/Oakland AileyCamp

at Cal Performances received major financial start-up support for its inaugural season last year from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, the California Arts Council Challenge Program, Wells Fargo and Vivendi Universal. The Hewlett Foundation

committed to a three-year sponsorship of the program, and the Zellerbach Family Fund added its support for the 2003 season. The program also received backing in 2003 from the Robert J. and Helen H. Glaser Family Foundation, Erika and Austin Hills,

The Audience Development Committee of Cal Performances' Board of Trustees and the Alameda/Contra Costa Chapter of Links, Inc. serve as community leaders and volunteers for recruitment, interviews and other general support.

Because of its backers, AileyCamp is able to provide all campers with full tuition scholarships, breakfast and lunch, camp uniforms and dance clothing. Many of them also get transportation to and from their neighborhoods.

Students are recruited at presentations in their schools, then individual applicants are interviewed by AileyCamp staffers and volunteer community leaders. Once selected, they commit to five weeks of intensive work in dance and self-discipline, with a big public performance at the end.

Last year, there were 75 participants; this year, 68.

One of this year's campers, in an unsigned testimonial, said that she was recruited by a friend who attended last year's camp.

"When I was there, I was amazed at how many different kinds of dance they were taught," she wrote. "I was brought up around the art of dance so I've been a dancer since I can remember. When I heard about the camp I thought it would be a good experience for me because I would meet new people, and learn different kinds of dance.

"...This is a place where you can talk to you elders, about stuff that you feel uncomfortable talking about to other people. Alvin Ailey Dance Camp is a wonderful place for people who want to have fun!"
