Dramatic baritone Lester Lynch has tackled many of the most iconic opera roles to great acclaim: Crown in *Porgy and Bess*, Wotan in *Das Rheingold*, the Conte di Luna in *Il Trovatore*,

winning quartet performing with pianist Jeremy Denk—winner of a MacArthur “Genius” Fellowship and the Avery Fisher Prize. The program features a work by Berkeley native Gabriela Lena Frank—who this year won both the Pulitzer Prize for Music and was named Composer of the Year by *Musical America*—that explores the delusions of Cervantes’ Don Quixote. The Romantic composer César Franck’s searing and sensual Piano Quintet in F minor showcases Denk’s passionate side. (The second performance takes place on Sunday, January 24, 2027.)

A contemporary of Bob Dylan and Joan Baez, the folksinger, songwriter, and activist became a household name with hit renditions of Joni Mitchell’s “Both Sides Now” and Stephen Sondheim’s “Send In the Clowns.” She has recorded 55 albums and, as a testament to her impact on the music world, artists such as Rufus Wainwright, Shawn Colvin, Dolly Parton, and Leonard Cohen honored her legacy with the album *Born to the Breed: A Tribute to Judy Collins*.

William Kentridge's *The Head & the Load* (West Coast Premiere)

Visionary South African artist William Kentridge returns to Cal Performances after two previous visits, featuring the US premiere of *SIBYL* in 2023 and the Bay Area premiere of *The Great Yes, The Great No* in 2025. This time, he brings the West Coast premiere of a seminal work that—through dance, projection, speech, song, shadow play, costume, and music—chronicles the untold history of more than two million Africans who labored, fought, and died during the First World War. *The Head & the Load* takes its name from a Ghanaian proverb, “The head and the load are the troubles of the neck,” and continues Kentridge’s exploration of history, language, and artistic and political movements through richly layered and inventive performance works.

Kentridge’s production unfolds on a massive stage, weaving together texts by anticolonial authors and Dada poets in multiple languages, with original music by Philip Miller and Thuthuka Sibisi that intermingles traditional African songs with quotes from WWI-era European music by Satie, Hindemith, and Schoenberg.

The Absence of Ruin is jazz pianist and composer Jason Moran's multidisciplinary meditation on the life and legacy of James Reese Europe, the underrecognized Black American composer and bandleader who landed in France with the Harlem Hellfighters on New Year's Day 1918. The celebrated all-Black unit helped break the stalemate on the Western Front during the First World War, while composer Europe's finely honed military music ensemble popularized the new spirit of jazz in a war-torn France fascinated with Black culture. Moran's layered work explores the idea of memory in Black culture, augmenting his long-standing Bandwagon bandmates—bassist Tarus Mateen and drummer Nasheet Waits—with a seven-piece horn section and visuals by Oscar-nominated cinematographer Bradford Young.

Revered for her sensitivity and deep musical insight, pianist Mitsuko Uchida returns to Berkeley in a solo recital of masterworks by composers with whom she has been closely associated over decades of performances and recordings. She was named *Musical America's* Artist of the Year in 2022 and has been a vital part of the leadership of the Marlboro Music Festival for more than 20 years. Additionally, her 2022 recording of Beethoven's *Diabelli Variations* was nominated for a Grammy Award and won the *Gramophone* Piano Award.
