CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY LAUNCHES ITS 2025-26 RECITAL SERIES WITH

COUNTERTENOR ARYEH NUSSBAUM COHEN AND PIANIST JOHN CHURCHWELL IN UNCHARTED SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 27 AT HERTZ HALL

PIANIST DANIIL TRIFONOV SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 28 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

Berkeley, August 6, 2025—Cal Performances launches its ambitious 2025–26 recital series this September with performances by two Grammy-winning artists over the course of one weekend. The first concert showcases countertenor Aryeh Nussbaum Cohen venturing beyond the traditional countertenor repertoire in an adventurous program entitled *Uncharted* with pianist John Churchwell,

at Hertz Hall on Saturday, September 27 at 8pm. Pianist **Daniil Trifonov** then performs a recital, recently revised, of an early piano sonata by Robert Schumann and underperformed works by Prokofiev, Myaskovsky, and Taneyev at Zellerbach Hall on Sunday, September 28 at 3pm.

The first of the two performers, Aryeh Nussbaum Cohen makes his Cal Performances headlining debut in his recital with pianist John Churchwell inspired by their most recent recording together, Uncharted. The acclaimed vocalist professes a particular affinity for Austro-Germanic lieder, and thus has programmed works by Erich Wolfgang Korngold, Clara and Robert Schumann, and Johannes Brahms—music that resonates profoundly with his family's German and Jewish heritage. The performance also features the West Coast premiere of a Cal Performances co-commission from composer Jake Heggie, Oh Children: Three Poems by Margaret Atwood. Nussbaum Cohen's talent is heightened by the deeply sensitive playing of Churchwell, head of music for San Francisco Opera and co-director of the Lehrer Vocal Institute at Music Academy of the West, who makes his Cal Performances debut with this recital. Nussbaum Cohen, who calls the Bay Area home, has graced the stages of some of the world's most renowned opera houses, including Glyndebourne and the Metropolitan Opera. His competition successes include winning the Grand Prize at the 2017 Metropolitan Opera Laffont Competition and top prizes in Houston Grand Opera's Eleanor McCollum Competition and the Dallas Opera Guild Competition. A graduate of the San Francisco Opera's prestigious Merola and Adler Fellowship Programs, he previously performed at Zellerbach Hall in the English Concert's 2023 performance of Handel's Rodelinda, singing the role of Unolfo.

The weekend of notable recitalists continues with a performance by pianist Daniil Trifonov the following day, Sunday, September 28. Trifonov is renowned as a solo artist, a champion of the concerto repertoire, a chamber music and vocal collaborator, and as a composer. He is known for constructing narrative arcs across the length of his concerts, and for delivering delicate moments in almost a whisper, while building layers of sound to conjure power and emotion from the keyboard. He was named *Gramophone*'s 2016 Artist of the Year and *Musical America*'s 2019 Artist of the Year, and was made a "Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres" by the French government in 2021. He has performed on all the world's major stages and with the most renowned international orchestras, including serving as 2024–25 artist in residence with both the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Czech Philharmonic. He recently announced that his next recording, *Tchaikovsky*, will feature a selection of the composer's solo works that reflects the composer at his most intimate and private; the recording is due to be released on October 4. The *Times* of London calls Trifonov

"without question the most astounding pianist of our age." Cal Performances presented him previously in a solo performance in 2022 and with violinist Gidon Kremer in 2015.

Other performers, both established and emerging, who are featured in Cal Performances 2025–26 recital series are Anne Sofie von Otter, mezzo-soprano and Kristian Bezuidenhout, fortepiano in *Schwanengesang*, October 5, 2025; Nobuyuki Tsujii, piano, October 30, 2025; Jeremy Denk, piano, November 14, 2025; Samantha Hankey, mezzo-soprano with Myra Huang, piano, January 18, 2026; Steven Banks, baritone saxophone with Xak Bjerken, piano in *Golden Silhouettes*, February 1, 2026; Bruce Liu, piano, February 10, 2026; Chris Thile, mandolin and vocals, February 27, 2026; Geneva Lewis, violin; Evren Ozel, piano, March 1, 2026; Alexandre Kantorow, piano, April 23, 2026; Víkingur Ólafsson, piano in a program entitled *Opus 109*, April 29, 2026; and Renée Fleming, soprano with Inon Barnatan, piano, May 3, 2026

Countertenor Arych Nussbaum Cohen ventures beyond the traditional countertenor repertoire, performing lieder in the Austro-Germanic tradition by Brahms, Clara and Robert Schumann, and Erich Wolfgang Korngold. This program also features works by Black American composers H. Leslie Adams and Florence Price, music inspired by Cohen's Jewish heritage, and the West Coast premiere of a recent piece co-commissoned by Cal Performances from composer Jake Heggie.
