We also welcome the return of **Víkingur Ólafsson** as our 2025–26 Artist in Residence. This masterful and ever-insightful pianist appears this fall as soloist in two concerts with London's extraordinary **Philharmonia Orchestra** under the baton of principal conductor **Santtu-Matias Rouvali**, and returns to our stage for a solo recital in the spring.

Our acclaimed dance series is distinguished by genre-defining artists and major new productions, including the renowned **Paris Opera Ballet** in the North American premiere of a new work by boundary-breaking choreographer **Hofesh Shechter**; the legendary **Martha Graham Dance Company** celebrating its centennial; **The Joffrey Ballet** in an otherworldly celebration of the traditional Scandinavian solstice festival and the longawaited Cal Performances debut of **A.I.M by Kyle Abraham**.

All of this, and so much more! As you explore the following pages, I hope you discover events that offer fresh perspectives, challenge and reward your spirit, and bring you joy.

I look forward to seeing you in the audience!

Cal Performances is thrilled to welcome back Icelandic pianist Víkingur Ólafsson as 2025-26 Artist in Residence, with three opportunities this season to experience his boundless creativity and keen interpretive prowess at the keyboard. Over the course of his celebrated career, Ólafsson has distinguished himself as that rare musician who both values the history and tradition of the canon, and seeks out opportunities to question orthodoxy in the pursuit of his own artistic truth. He is closely associated with the music of Bach, Rameau, Mozart, Chopin, and Debussy, but is also praised for his renditions of Philip Glass' music and is a committed champion of works by other living composers. Ólafsson's direct style and uncompromising integrity have captivated classical music aficionados and newcomers alike, and all listeners will welcome his return to the UC Berkeley campus, where his May 2024 recital was hailed as "an astonishing triumph of keyboard virtuosity and sparkling personality" (San Francisco Classical Voice).

London's stellar Philharmonia Orchestra returns to Berkeley with Finnish maestro Santtu-Matias Rouvali—one of the most sought-after conductors of his generation—making his Berkeley debut! In two programs featuring 2025-26 season Artist in Residence Víkingur Ólafsson, orchestra, conductor, and soloist take us on a spectacular journey through a sublime collection of works, from Romantic masterpieces to an exciting new commission.

The first concert features Ólafsson as soloist in Beethoven's iconic Emperor concerto, as well as the orchestra performing Sibelius' Fifth Symphony, a majestic work evoking a vast, unfolding Nordic landscape. The program also includes the Bay Area premiere of a new commission by Mexican composer Gabriela Ortiz, a truly original voice in concert music who won three 2025 Grammy Awards for a recording of her most recent orchestral works.

The second concert matches Ravel's frolicking, jazz-inflected Piano Concerto in G major with Shostakovich's emotionally turbulent and engrossing Fifth Symphony.

It will not surprise Ólafsson's many fans that his newest project goes deep. Previously, he devoted an entire season of performances to Bach's Goldberg Variations—playing the cycle for 88 concerts in total, including at Cal Performances in May 2024-because, in his words, "I wanted to know how deeply I can dive into a composition and how many different facets I can discover in it." He won a Grammy this year for his sterling recording of that work. Here, Ólafsson turns his attention to Beethoven's innovative and emotive Opus 109 piano sonata, taking us on a journey of musical inspiration and influence that includes side trips through the keyboard music of Bach and Schubert, interspersed between movements.

Praised for its "total commitment" (*The Strad*) as an ensemble and for "exquisitely unified playing" (*Washington Classical Review*), the fabulous Isidore Quartet returns with a program that combines familiar repertoire with an exciting recent discovery. Gabriella Smith's *Carrot Revolution* mines contrasting musical influences to explore, in her words, "new ways of looking at old things." Haydn's burnished and brilliant *Sunrise* quartet represents the height of his mastery, and Dvořák's joyful penultimate quartet in G major is bursting with color and lyricism.

It's a match made in heaven: revered conductor Riccardo Muti and his beloved Chicago Symphony Orchestra, reconvening in Berkeley for a program of orchestral gems for one night only. Muti, who turns 84 this year, stepped down as the esteemed ensemble's music director to assume the role of Music Director Emeritus for Life in 2023, but his close rapport with this group of remarkable musicians continues to enchant. Muti excels at Brahms and here conducts the composer's majestic Fourth Symphony; Stravinsky's delightful suite from the ballet *The Fairy's Kiss*; and Ravel's ever-popular *Boléro*, which, with its sensuously hypnotic theme, builds the concert to a volcanic climax. "Under Muti, the Chicago Symphony is all power and finesse....He barely had to move for the players to unleash torrents of stupendous, beautifully balanced sound" (*The New York Times*).

As it enters its 51st season, the renowned Takács Quartet continues to deepen its connections to timeless masterworks and enliven the string quartet repertoire through fresh artistic collaborations. For its first concert this season, the group is joined by award-winning Jamaican American violist Jordan Bak in his Cal Performances debut for a rare performance of Mozart's revelatory viola quintets in C major (K. 515) and G minor (K. 516). Bak adds his "haunting lyrical grace" (Gramophone) to the Takács' telepathic ensemble blend in these works of exceptional melodic beauty and textural clarity. Schubert's dramatic single-movement Quartettsatz opens the program.

The season's second Takács visit features the Bay Area premiere of a new work co-commissioned by Cal Performances from polyglot composer and pianist Clarice Assad, one of the most popular Brazilian American concert-music composers of her generation. As the ensemble says about the collaboration, "Clarice's music inspires interactive spirit and theatrical energy—we feel liberated by her limitless imagination." The program also includes Haydn's bold and exuberant Rider quartet and Debussy's kinetic, colorful sole quartet.

Chamber music visionaries, ambassadors, impresarios, and virtuosos—as co-directors of both Music@Menlo and the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, cellist David Finckel and pianist Wu Han are a ubiquitous presence on both coasts. The energy they bring to their leadership in the arts is matched only by the powerful synergy of their duo performances. Here, the Cal Performances favorites offer a program spanning more than two-and-a-half centuries, from Bach to John Corigliano, and featuring Debussy's masterful sonata, Chopin's last major work, and a rarely performed Britten sonata composed for Mstislav Rostropovich. In this sweeping program centered on the beauty of the natural world, Aryeh Nussbaum Cohen lends his "ravishing, otherworldly" (Opera News) voice to an exciting collection of familiar and fresh songs. Nussbaum Cohen enjoys venturing beyond the usual countertenor repertoire, and has carved out a unique path by being the only artist of his voice type to record lieder in the Austro-Germanic tradition by Brahms, Clara and Robert Schumann, and Erich Wolfgang Korngold. He complements those moody works with songs by Black American composers H. Leslie Adams and Florence Price, music inspired by his Jewish heritage, and the West Coast premiere of Oh Children!, a Cal Performances co-commissioned work by Jake Heggie.

The magisterial mezzo-soprano Anne Sofie von Otter has shown that her formidable powers know no bounds—from her diva status as the superlative Octavian (Der Rosenkavalier) of her generation; to long associations with Carlos Kleiber, Claudio Abbado, and Sir Colin Davis, and genre-crossing collaborations with Elvis Costello, Brad Mehldau, and Rufus Wainwright. With acclaimed keyboardist Kristian Bezuidenhout, von Otter brings "strikingly imaginative intensity" (Gramophone) to Schubert's Schwanengesang song cycle, a collection first published after the composer's death that mines complex emotional terrain, from love and despair to sorrow and serenity. A selection of Schubert keyboard interludes showcases Bezuidenhout's supreme poetry.





Japanese pianist Nobuyuki Tsujii—known to his legion of fans simply as Nobu—is that rare classical musician with a pop star's following. Since winning the gold medal at the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, he has gone on to a stellar international career, filling concert halls with his emotionally direct, charismatic interpretations. Here he plays Beethoven's timeless *Appassionata* sonata, Mikhail Pletnev's piano adaptation of music from Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*, and Prokofiev's tumultuous seventh sonata. "[Nobu] brings quite an unusual gift to the performances he gives—interpretations which are entirely focused on the possibilities of sound and feeling; he almost reinvents the music he is playing" (Seen and Heard International).

This season, the MacArthur Fellow, author, and noted musical commentator returns to Cal Performances with Bach's six keyboard partitas, compositions known for being as technically intricate as they are sublime. It is not every day you get to hear a saxophone virtuoso reimagine seminal works composed for bassoon, cello, and voice on his deeply expressive instrument of choice. In his Cal Performances debut, Steven Banks, "the saxophone's best friend, fiercest advocate, and primary virtuoso in the classical realm" (Washington Post) and the first saxophonist to win the coveted Avery Fisher Career Grant, offers a whirlwind musical tour on the mighty baritone saxophone. His recital features works by two celebrated American composers—a duet commissioned from Carlos Simon and a blues-inflected song cycle by John Musto-and cello showpieces by Beethoven and Barber. Banks reveals the dramatic layers in these works in his inspired interpretations, fueled by a burnished, glimmering tone.



The young Chinese Canadian pianist Bruce Liu has caught the attention of listeners worldwide, praised for "playing of breathtaking beauty" (BBC Music Magazine) and an "effortless virtuosity [that] consistently oozes charisma" (Classics Today). Ever since taking first prize at the International Chopin Piano Competition in 2021, Liu's star has been on the rise, with warmly received recitals on many of the world's most prestigious concert stages. His Cal Performances debut program features a pleasing selection of that award-winning Chopin, Beethoven's ever-popular Moonlight sonata, and a trio of pieces inspired by Spanish themes.

A dazzling virtuoso and musical shapeshifter, the "extroverted, stellar, and spectacular mandolinist" (Los Angeles Times) Chris Thile brings the full range of emotions to his eclectic recital performances. Thile is always compelling, whether shredding on the mandolin, singing a ballad, or telling charming stories that recall his time as host of the public radio program Live from Here. Drawing on selections from Laysongs, his first-ever solo recording from 2024, the MacArthur Fellow and four-time Grammy winner is just as likely to play his highly personal take on a Bach partita as he is a classic bluegrass tune or one of his introspective original songs. In her Cal Performances debut, she plays a lean late-period masterpiece by Schoenberg, Bach's E major violin sonata, and Schubert's deeply conversational Fantasy in C major. Pianist Evren Ozel returns to campus for this dynamite recital pairing following his impressive March 2025 Berkeley debut. Among the most celebrated singers of our time, 2023 Kennedy Center Honoree and five-time Grammy winner Renée Fleming captivates with her sumptuous voice, consummate artistry, and riveting stage presence. A restless and innately collaborative creative spirit, Fleming's recent work has found her on stage for the world premiere of Kevin Puts' *The Hours* at the Metropolitan Opera, and on screen in a new series of IMAX films, *Renée Fleming's Cities That Sing.* In this special recital, Fleming joins with star pianist Inon Barnatan for a program of beloved songs, arias, and piano showpieces. Britain's extraordinary early-music ensemble visits with another exquisite concert performance of a Handel masterwork in what has become an eagerly anticipated highlight of each Cal Performances season. Hercules is a fine showcase for the richly expressive mezzo-soprano Ann Hallenberg, who sings the demanding role of the hero's wife Dejanira, evolving from impatience to rage to despair as her jealousy leads her to murder and madness. Sung in English, Hercules also features some of Handel's most gorgeous choral writing, showcasing the crystalline voices of New York City's Clarion Choir. "A certain magic occurs when Bicket gives the down beat: the players unleash gleaming rays of sound" (The New York Times).

The exciting next-generation period-instrument ensemble Twelfth Night makes its Berkeley debut with a lively concert performance of Handel's romantic comedy *Aminta e Fillide*. Founded by violinist Rachell Ellen Wong and harpsichordist David Belkovski (who made their explosive Cal Performances debuts with cellist Coleman Itzkoff in the 2022–23 season), the group has been praised for its "sensitivity and virtuosity" and "impeccable playing" (*New York Classical Review*). As the shepherd Aminta, soprano Nicoletta Berry sings the beloved aria "Se vago rio fra sassi"; and as the nymph Fillide, mezzo-soprano Megan Moore gives us "Fiamma bella ch'al ciel s'invia." Excerpts from Vivaldi's opera *Il Giustino* showcase the ensemble's fiery instrumentalists.

Charismatic and accomplished violinist Théotime Langlois de Swarte returns to Berkeley with harpsichordist Justin Taylor, for a thrilling program of Baroque showpieces. In Bach's sonatas, the keyboard rises to equal partner with the violin, as the two parts swirl and spar in buoyant counterpoint. The duo also performs an arrangement of Vivaldi's Op. 3 violin concerto in D major and programs Bach's solo keyboard arrangement of that work as a fascinating complement. "They move as one breathing, feeling body, and it's spellbinding..." (*The Guardian*).

Catalan viol virtuoso Jordi Savall returns with the follow-up to his compelling *Routes of Slavery* program honoring the more than 25 million people enslaved by Western nations over close to four centuries. Savall is joined by nearly three dozen musicians, including his celebrated ensembles Hespèrion XXI and La Capella Reial de Catalunya, the Mexican group Tembembe Ensamble Continuo, and special guest performers from Canada, Guinea, Guadeloupe, Mali, Brazil, Cuba, Haiti, and Venezuela who place their rich musical traditions in dialogue with Spanish and European forms. "[Savall] illustrates with striking detail the way that music served as an unbroken thread that traversed the Atlantic, a cultural fabric that flourishes to this day" (*San Francisco Chronicle*).
