CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY

OFFERS LIVE AUDIO DESCRIPTIONS FOR BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED PATRONS AT 10 PERFORMANCES IN THE 2025–26 SEASON

Berkeley, CA, September 23, 2025—For the third season in a row, Cal Performances at UC Berkeley is making live audio descriptions available to blind and visually impaired patrons at select dance and theater performances held in Zellerbach Hall throughout the year. This live audio track—delivered by a professional describer to audience members through a wireless headset system—is intended to provide clear and engaging descriptions of the meaningful visual details of a performance. Through a partnership with <u>Gravity Access Services</u>, these live audio descriptions are offered at the 10 performances listed below. The descriptions employ headsets that can be reserved at no additional charge, either at the time of ticket purchase or by contacting the Cal Performances Ticket Office at (510) 642-9988 or <u>tickets@calperformances.org</u>. Steeped in a ballet tradition that dates to the court of Louis XIV, the dancers of the Paris Opera Ballet meet the visceral and emotive choreography of London-based choreographer Hofesh Shechter in the North American premiere of a new full-length work. Shechter creates vivid, urgent cinematic tableaus in his works, and his new creation—which will be danced to live music provided by a quartet of cello, double bass, drums, and a brass instrument—has been envisioned especially for the Paris Opera Ballet, whose tour includes only two US cities, with Berkeley as the only on the West Coast.

Note: There may be limited parking available close to the UC Berkeley campus on the afternoon of the performance due to it being Homecoming Weekend.

Mark Morris/MOON (West Coast Premiere, Cal Performances Co-commission)

Choreographer Mark Morris looks upward at the Moon as his next source of inspiration, exploring humankind's fascination with the constant celestial companion. This new multimedia work danced

before a backdrop featuring video, animation, and photo stills of the Moon is set to live and recorded music that includes popular American songbook tunes, as well as excerpts from NASA's Golden Record—a gold-plated copper phonograph record that was launched into space on the Voyager 1 and Voyager 2 spacecrafts in 1977, carrying sounds and images of Earth as a message to any potential extraterrestrial life. The live music features selections from Marcel Dupré's 24 Inventions, Op. 50 and György Ligeti's Musica ricercata, performed on piano, organ, and double bass. Morris says of earthlings' attempts to understand their enigmatic neighbor, "I'm interested in how the Moon came to be our fall-in-love token, and the mystery and glamour of it."

As early as the 1930s, the members of Martha Graham's company reflected diverse cultural backgrounds, and Graham's commitment to experimentation and attention to contemporary social, political, psychological, and gender issues has forever altered the scope and direction of the art form.

The Graham company returns to Cal Performances for the first time in more than a decade to celebrate its 100th anniversary with classic Graham works such as the iconic *Appalachian Spring* featuring Isamu Noguchi's original sets—alongside newly commissioned dances by contemporary choreographers. Sunday's matinee includes the Bay Area premiere of *En Masse* by Ailey alum Hope Boykin as well as Jamar Roberts' *We the People*, a collaboration with roots musician Rhiannon Giddens that explores rage and resistance.

Choreographer Kyle Abraham brings A.I.M company to Berkeley for its Cal Performances debut featuring three works danced to live performances of the music that inspired them. Abraham tells stories at the intersection of Black and queer culture, reflecting on themes of love, isolation, and personal and social change. Max Roach's track "The Gettin" from his *Freedom Now Suite* infuses the movement on stage with a taut, edgy energy. *If We Were a Love Song* features moody music by Nina Simone sung by Crystal Monee Hall, setting the stage for a series of intimate solos and duets exploring different aspects of love. And the new 2 X 4 is a collaboration with composer and saxophonist Shelley Washington fueled by contrasts and oppositions.

This original presentation of the fairy tale *Beauty and the Beast* blurs the distinctions between film and live opera, merging Jean Cocteau's classic 1946 romantic fantasy story on screen with Philip Glass' 1994 score. Glass composed the music as a new soundtrack to the film, transforming the original spoken French dialogue into sung libretto. Now Opera Parallèle has responded to the dreamlike, subconscious elements of the story with its own new film and stage direction, further blurring the

barriers between the characters onscreen and the singers on stage.

The Joffrey Ballet continues its association with Cal Performances with a signature work, Alexander Ekman's celebration of the traditional Scandinavian summer solstice festival. A trip to a surreal realm of earthly and supernatural delights, *Midsummer Night's Dream* features a musical score by composer Mikael Karlsson to be performed live by Swedish indie rock sensation Anna von Hausswolff and an on-stage band. Dancers cavort in pastoral revelry as reality and fantasy blur in a joyous ode to the arrival of the summer season.
