CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS A FEATURED PERFORMANCE OF THIS SEASON'S ILLUMINATIONS: "FRACTURED HISTORY" SERIES

STORY BOLDLY'S DEFINING COURAGE

AN IMMERSIVE LIVE EVENT FRIDAY, APRIL 4 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

Creator David Ono participates in a post-performance panel discussion with UC Berkeley faculty and scholars, free to all ticket holders

Berkeley, CA, March 12, 2025—Cal Performances at UC Berkeley presents *Defining Courage*, a unique theatrical experience that combines documentary film, live music, and eyewitness interviews to commemorate the struggles and sacrifices of the Nisei soldiers of World War II. Taking place on Friday, April 4 at 8pm at Zellerbach Hall, *Defining Courage* is a project of Story Boldly, a nonprofit initiative devoted to journalistic storytelling founded by Emmy Award-winning creator **David Ono**. Narrated by Ono, a news anchor at ABC-7 Los Angeles, *Defining Courage* features music by

Raise, the UC Berkeley Chamber Chorus, and Trio Barclay. Multi-platinum songwriter and performer Harold Payne and six-time Grammy winner Daniel Ho make special appearances.

Defining Courage is part of Cal Performances' Illuminations: "Fractured History" programming for the 2024–25 season.

Serving in segregated units during World War II, the Nisei soldiers were Americans of Japanese ancestry, among the war's most decorated soldiers who fought abroad as part of the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, and the Military Intelligence Service. Largely unrecognized for their remarkable service, these veterans enlisted in the US military while many of their families were held in incarceration camps in the US; despite being identified and persecuted as "enemy aliens" within the US, the Nisei volunteered for combat. Ono describes the project as a work of historic reclamation: "They're truly some of America's greatest heroes ... [I was shocked at] how they just kind of faded back into the background, never to be adored, never to be thanked or congratulated."

He continues, "The goal was to create an unforgettable show that combines live music and narration with multimedia storytelling. It is the perfect way to keep this important story alive in the most memorable way."

Defining Courage is one of eight distinct Illuminations: "Fractured History" performances this season investigating collective memory and the complex evolution of historical narratives to consider what role the performing arts might play in restoring nuance to our understanding of the past, and how that understanding shapes our present and future. As part of *Illuminations*, a post-performance panel entitled *The Legacy of Nisei Soldiers, Storytelling, and the Fight for Justice* is planned in Zellerbach Hall directly following the performance. The discussion is moderated by <u>Michael Omi</u>, professor emeritus of UC Berkeley's Department of Ethnic Studies, and brings together David Ono, creator of *Defining Courage*; <u>Alice Yang</u>, chair of UC Santa Cruz's Department of History; <u>Don Tamaki</u>, attorney and advocate for Japanese American reparations; and <u>Jovan Scott Lewis</u>, professor and chair of UC Berkeley's Department of Geography. Together, the panelists will discuss how different forms of storytelling, including performance, journalism, and

legal advocacy, can correct this historical record and bring greater awareness to untold or misrepresented histories. The discussion is free and open to all ticket holders that evening.

Defining Courage commemorates the struggles and sacrifices of the Nisei soldiers of World War II through cinematography, live music, eyewitness interviews, and storytelling. Serving in segregated units, these Americans of Japanese ancestry were among the war's most decorated soldiers, unsung heroes fighting for the US while many of their families were in incarceration camps back at home. Narrated by Emmy Award-winning creator **David Ono**, a news anchor at ABC-7 Los Angeles, Defining Courage features live music performed by gospel-pop group **Raise**, the **UC Berkeley Chamber Chorus**, and **Trio Barclay**, songwriter and performer **Harold Payne**, and six-time Grammy winner **Daniel Ho.** The performance is part of Cal Performances' <u>Illuminations</u>: "Fractured <u>History"</u> programming for the 2024–25 season.
