Berkeley, CA, January 3, 2025—Cal Performances at UC Berkeley announces an ambitious slate of jazz and roots music concerts this winter, featuring emerging and established artists presenting deeply personal takes on a wide range of vernacular and popular music. All of the headline artists in this series are making their Cal Performances debuts as leaders this season.

Starting off the new year, percussionist/composer **Antonio Sánchez** performs his Grammywinning soundtrack to *Birdman* to a live screening of the film on Saturday, January 18 at 8pm at Zellerbach Hall. Award-winning next-generation vocalist **Samara Joy** leads a jazz octet on Wednesday, February 5 at 7:30pm at Zellerbach Hall. And hard-swinging pianist **Sullivan Fortner** brings his trio for a concert of original jazz and new arrangements on Thursday, March 13 at 7:30pm at Zellerbach Playhouse. Finally, roots music singer and songwriter **Martha Redbone** leads a collaboration between her **Martha Redbone Roots Project** and **American Patchwork Quartet** that explores the United States' rich cultural tapestry on Friday, February 28 at 8pm at Zellerbach Hall. The performance by Redbone and company is part of Cal Performances' *Illumination*s: "Fractured History" programming for the 2024–25 season [more below].

Antonio Sánchez, Birdman LIVE

In Alejandro Iñárritu's 2014 film *Birdman*, Antonio Sánchez's drumming acts as a visceral foil for the psychological turmoil of Michael Keaton's character, a washed-up Hollywood actor struggling to make a comeback by writing, directing, and acting on Broadway. Sánchez's largely improvised solo drumming won a Grammy for Best Score Soundtrack, and the film won that year's Oscar for Best Picture. On Saturday, January 18 at 8pm at Zellerbach Hall, Sánchez returns to Cal Performances (having previously appeared with guitarists Pat Metheny and Paco de Lucía) to celebrate the film's 10th anniversary with a live solo drum concert and film screening for Berkeley audiences.

Samara Joy

Three-time Grammy-winning vocalist Samara Joy is among the biggest names in jazz today, known for her gospel-inflected, easy swinging renditions of classic jazz repertoire. This year she has been nominated for two additional Grammys—Best Jazz Vocal Album for *A Joyful Holiday*, and Best Jazz Performance for a duet with pianist Sullivan Fortner [see below]. Joy is joined by **David Mason** and **Kendric McCallister**, woodwinds; **Jason Charos**, trumpet; **Donavan Austin**, trombone; **Connor Rohrer**, piano; **Paul Sikivie**, bass; and **Evan Sherman**, drums. She performs on Wednesday, February 5 at 7:30pm at Zellerbach Hall.

This Land is Our Land

Featuring Martha Redbone Roots Project and American Patchwork Quartet

Roots music singer and songwriter Martha Redbone leads *This Land Is Our Land*, a new collaboration between her Martha Redbone Roots Project and the genre-defying American Patchwork Quartet on Friday, February 28 at 8pm at Zellerbach Hall. Redbone draws on her heritage as a southeastern Cherokee/Choctaw and Black American woman to craft songs that celebrate the human spirit, infused with the folk and blues sounds of her childhood in the Appalachian Mountains of Kentucky. Led by Grammy-winning guitarist and vocalist **Clay Ross**, American Patchwork Quartet is on a selfprofessed "mission to reclaim the immigrant soul of American roots music." The ensemble's repertoire merges folk songs with jazz, country music, and sounds from West Africa and Asia, and features members **Falguni Shah (Falu)**, vocals; **Yasushi Nakamura**, bass; and **Clarence Penn**, drums. The Martha Redbone Roots Project consists of Redbone, vocals and percussion; **Aaron Whitby**, piano and vocals; **Charlie Burnham**, violin and vocals; and **Fred Cash**, bass and vocals.

The performance continues this season's *Illuminations* programming, which explores the idea of "Fractured History" through eight performances and a series of related public and classroom programs created with visiting artists and university partners. Through this series, Cal Performances investigates collective memory and the complex evolution of historical narratives to consider what role the performing arts might play in restoring nuance to our understanding of the past, and how that understanding shapes our present and future. Pianist Sullivan Fortner, who appeared as a sideman with Cécile McLorin Salvant at her January 2024 Zellerbach Hall concert, makes his Cal Performances debut as a bandleader with bassist **Tyrone Allen** and drummer **Kayvon Gordon** on Thursday, March 13 at 7:30pm at Zellerbach Playhouse. Sullivan has developed a distinctive approach to jazz that combines his New Orleans heritage with the hard bop sounds of New York and a cosmopolitan flair born from years touring with luminaries like Roy Hargrove and Salvant. He was nominated for a 2025 Grammy for his most recent release, a solo recording that features original compositions alongside classics by Stevie Wonder, Antônio Carlos Jobim, Kurt Weill, and Duke Ellington.

Only 25 years of age, and with a deep foundation in jazz and gospel music, talented vocalist Samara Joy won Best Jazz Vocal Album and Best New Artist at the 2023 Grammy Awards for her debut release, an old-school affair that explores classic tunes associated with Carmen McRae, Nat King Cole, and Billie Holiday, and followed it with a third Grammy, for Best Jazz Performance in 2024. This year, she has been nominated for two additional Grammys—Best Jazz Vocal Album for *A Joyful Holiday*, and Best Jazz Performance for a duet with pianist Sullivan Fortner.

Over the past decade, pianist Sullivan Fortner has developed a distinctive approach to jazz that combines his New Orleans heritage with the hard bop sounds of New York and a cosmopolitan flair born from years touring the world with luminaries like Roy Hargrove and Cécile McLorin Salvant. Fortner's most recent release is a solo recording that showcases the breadth of his artistry, featuring original compositions alongside classics by Stevie Wonder, Antônio Carlos Jobim, Kurt Weill, and Duke Ellington. Cal Performances audiences will recall his role as a sideman with Salvant at her January 2024 Zellerbach Hall concert; with this performance, he makes his Cal Performances debut as a bandleader with a hard-swinging trio of like-minded talents.
