MARK MORRIS DANCE GROUP IN THE WEST COAST PREMIERE OF MOON

A CAL PERFORMANCES CO-COMMISSION FRIDAY–SUNDAY, JANUARY 23–25, 2026 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

MOON celebrates the mystery and poetry of the Moon through Astronauts, Ligeti, and Swing

Morris Has Assembled an All-Star Creative Team for *MOON*: Wendall K. Harrington's projections and Isaac Mizrahi's costumes make for a Celestial Spectacle

Berkeley, CA, December 12, 2025—Cal Performances at UC Berkeley welcomes back the Mark Morris Dance Group for the West Coast premiere of Morris' latest creation, MOON, on Friday—

Saturday, January 23–24 at 8pm; and Sunday, January 25 at 3pm at Zellerbach Hall. Co-commissioned by Cal Performances, *MOON* poetically explores mankind's fascination with the Moon in popular imagination and throughout human history. The hour-long work for nine dancers is inspired by the Golden Record, an audio recording placed aboard the two 1977 Voyager spacecrafts as a means of communicating with extraterrestrials. The dreamy, whimsical, and witty performance draws from a wide range of textual, visual, and musical sources, which Morris weaves together with his signature musicality.

For MOON, Mark Morris assembled a celebrated team of collaborators to craft a multi-layered sensory experience. Wendall K. Harrington—head of projection design at Yale School of Drama, veteran of more than 35 Broadway shows, and winner of numerous awards—contributed her expertise in this first-time collaboration with Morris. Her vivid visual landscape incorporates stunning imagery inspired by NASA and the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum. Harrington says the projections she designed for MOON "convey the mathematical magic that conquered gravity and got us the Moon as well as the earthy and romantic imagery that keeps lovers moonstruck." Dancers are outfitted in lunar-themed costumes created by celebrated designer Isaac Mizrahi, who often utilized reflective fabric to interact with the lighting design by Mike Faba. The set is completed with animated astronaut sculptures by artist Ottmar Hörl.

MOON is set to a soundtrack that is both celestial and nostalgic. Live music performed by Mark Morris Dance Group musical director **Colin Fowler** on keyboards and bassist **Michel Taddei** features selections from Marcel Dupré's 24 Inventions, Op. 50, Claude Debussy's Clair de Lune and György Ligeti's Musica ricercata interwoven with recordings of popular swing, bluegrass, and country songs from the American songbook of the 1930s and '40s that share a "moon" theme.

Says Morris, "MOON is a dance and music show built on thoughts and studies of our Moon. The source of so much mystery, curiosity, ritual, superstition, art, and fascination, there is a lot to celebrate and to puzzle over. The moon is credited with time and tide, fertility, power, and romance. The desire to touch the moon and know about it has always driven us, as has the compulsion to make contact with potential beings on other heavenly bodies. I hope to provide a possible way to observe and enjoy the Moon and space, without understanding a thing."

For blind and visually impaired audience members, Cal Performances offers a live audio description for the Sunday, January 25 performance of *MOON*. This live audio track—delivered by a

professional describer to audience members through a wireless headset system—provides clear and engaging descriptions of the meaningful visual details of a performance. Live audio descriptions are

provided at no extra charge and the headsets can be reserved at the time of ticket purchase.

The Berkeley performances of MOON are the first since the work premiered at the Kennedy Center

in April 2025.

Mark Morris

Mark Morris has been hailed as "the most prodigiously gifted choreographer of the post-Balanchine

era" (Time). In addition to creating more than 150 works for his dance group, which he founded in

1980, Morris conducts orchestras, directs opera, and choreographs for ballet companies around the

world. Morris is a MacArthur Foundation Fellow, and has received 11 honorary doctorates to date.

His other notable accomplishments include winning the Samuel H. Scripps/American Dance

Festival Award for Lifetime Achievement, the Leonard Bernstein Lifetime Achievement Award for

the Elevation of Music in Society, and the Benjamin Franklin Laureate Prize for Creativity. The New

York Times describes Morris as "the most successful and influential choreographer alive, and

indisputably the most musical," and live music is integral to every Mark Morris Dance Group

performance. The group has toured with its musicians, the Mark Morris Dance Group Music

Ensemble, since 1996.

Mark Morris Dance Group & Cal Performances Partnership

The Mark Morris Dance Group, formed in 1980, first performed in Berkeley in 1987, and began

making annual visits in 1994, officially dubbing Cal Performances its "West Coast home away from

home" in 2002. Over the course of an artistic relationship spanning nearly 40 years, the Mark Morris

Dance Group has performed 14 world premieres in Berkeley, and Cal Performances has

commissioned or co-commissioned 12 new works from Morris.
