## CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS SARABANDE AFRICAINE ANGÉLIQUE KIDJO AND YO-YO MA AT THE GREEK THEATRE LABOR DAY WEEKEND: SAT, AUG 30

Kidjo and Ma connect African and European music traditions in *Sarabande Africaine* at the historic outdoor amphitheater on the UC Berkeley campus

Berkeley, July 1, 2025 —Cal Performances presents vocalist **Angélique Kidjo** and cellist **Yo-Yo Ma** at UC Berkeley's historic Greek Theatre, in a special Labor Day weekend performance on Saturday, August 30 at 8pm. The two will be joined onstage by **Thierry Vaton**, **David Donatien**, and special guest **Sinkane** to perform the Bay Area premiere of their *Sarabande Africaine*, a program that surfaces the many centuries of interaction between African musical idioms and western music. Known for their work as both artists and activists, the two luminaries of the international music scene use the Baroque *sarabande* dance form—and its possible African antecedent, a dance to worship the

Congolese spirit Zarabanda—as a springboard to reveal the many threads that connect the cultures, genres, and traditions that underpin cultural thinking.

The concert is part of Cal Performances' <u>Illuminations</u>: "Exile & Sanctuary" programming for the 2025–26 season that connects seven unique performances to academic research on the UC Berkeley campus. Exile is defined in this thematic context as more than physical displacement, but as a rupture of identity, a stripping away of the familiar that leaves an individual or community without a sense of belonging. Sanctuary, alternatively, can represent both a refuge and a creative space where new forms of belonging are forged.

Ma shares, "Every day there are moments when all of us can feel we are on the *inside* of something and also when we feel we are on the *outside* of something. To be able to understand both at the same time and oscillate between the two gives us a larger perspective on the world." Kidjo expounds, "If your mind is open, and there is no fear, it's easier to listen, and to question yourself."

A visionary artistic thinker, Kidjo's participation was central to both the performance and public programming components of the 2021–22 *Illuminations* theme "<u>Place and Displacement</u>." The 2021 Bay Area premiere of her original musical theater work *Yemandja* presented in Zellerbach Hall was set against the backdrop of slavery in 19th-century West Africa, and offered a critical perspective in understanding the yearlong theme. During that same season, Kidjo took part in the *Illuminations* panel discussion *Bias in Our Algorithms and Society*, for which she was joined by leading campus scholars including Jennifer Chayes, the current Dean of UC Berkeley's College of Computing, Data Science, and participated in a campus dialogue with faculty and members of the Black Studies Collaboratory that focused on *Music, Diaspora, and the World*. Videos of these talks and those with other artists and Berkeley scholars exploring topics related to *Illuminations* themes can be found on Cal Performances' *Illuminations* YouTube playlist.

In addition to their connections to *Illuminations*, both Kidjo and Yo-Yo Ma are frequent artistic collaborators with Cal Performances. Kidjo served as the organization's Artist in Residence during the 2021–22 season, a role that featured the Bay Area premiere of *Yemandja*, co-commissioned by Cal Performances, and a concert performance of her reinterpretation of the Talking Heads' *Remain in Light* album. She returned to Zellerbach Hall with her band for a performance in 2024. Ma has performed for Berkeley audiences since 1997, performing Bach's complete cello suites at the Greek Theater in 2018 as well as appearing in recitals with pianists Emanuel Ax and Kathryn Stott and

violinist Leonidas Kavakos; as a member of the Silkroad Ensemble and of the Goat Rodeo Sessions; and alongside the Mark Morris Dance Group. In recognition of his exceptional achievement in the performing arts, Cal Performances honored Ma with its <u>Award of Distinction</u> in 2014.
