# CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS

# TWYLA THARP DANCE DIAMOND JUBILEE

IN THE WEST COAST PREMIERE OF SLACKTIDE,
WITH A SCORE BY PHILIP GLASS
PERFORMED LIVE BY
THIRD COAST PERCUSSION
AND CONSTANCE VOLK, FLUTE
FEBRUARY 7–9 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

Berkeley, January 13, 2025—Cal Performances at UC Berkeley continues its dynamic and eclectic 2024–25 dance season with the long-awaited return of Twyla Tharp Dance as part of the choreographer's current Diamond Jubilee tour, celebrating Tharp's 60-year career as one of the most influential and popular American choreographers of her generation. For the first time in 10 years, Tharp's company will return to Zellerbach Hall for three performances on February 7–8 at 8pm and February 9 at 3pm. The program features the West Coast premiere of *SLACKTIDE*, danced to a score by composer Philip Glass performed live by Chicago's Grammy-winning Third Coast Percussion and featuring flutist Constance Volk. Tharp also revives *Diabelli*, a signature ensemble

work from 1998 inspired by Beethoven's *Diabelli Variations* with music performed live by pianist **Vladimir Rumyantsev**.

SLACKTIDE reunites two titans of contemporary performing arts for the first time in nearly 40 years—since Tharp and Glass' exhilarating 1986 creation, *In the Upper Room*. In close collaboration with Tharp, Third Coast Percussion has arranged Glass' hypnotic 1993–99 score *Aguas da Amazonia*, which they perform live on a collection of custom-designed percussion instruments. Flutist Constance Volk will join the group performing a series of solos she has composed for the arrangement, which the artists have also recorded together. Tharp's choreography captures the layered rhythms and propulsive energy of Glass' iconic music that reflects on the crisis of climate change.

In *Diabelli*, Tharp's choreography highlights the intense humanity of Beethoven's fiendishly challenging composition, bringing out its humor, pathos, and tenderness. The technically demanding work asks dancers to shift effortlessly from ballet to jazz and contemporary dance, even incorporating social dance. Russian-born pianist Vladimir Rumyantsev joins the dancers as accompanist and sparring partner for this choreographic and musical journey.

Tharp is renowned for creating technically precise, uncategorizable works that have pushed the boundaries of ballet and contemporary dance. Tharp founded Twyla Tharp Dance in New York City 1965 and, in addition to creating dances for her company as well as for American Ballet Theatre, she has choreographed Tony-winning Broadway shows, Emmy-winning television specials, and blockbuster Hollywood films including *Amadeus* and *Ragtime*.

Chicago-based Third Coast Percussion—Sean Connors, Robert Dillon, Peter Martin, and David Skidmore—is the first percussion ensemble ever to win a Grammy award. Celebrating its 20th anniversary in 2025, the quartet is best known for interpretations of works by John Cage and Steve Reich, and for its robust commissioning program through which it has developed close relationships with numerous living composers. Third Coast Percussion has also previously created first recordings of several commissioned works by Glass, including *Perpetulum* (2019) and *Metamorphosis No. 1* (2022).

Through Cal Performances' Golden Bear Circle program, UC Berkeley students are eligible to purchase a limited number of \$10 tickets for the best seats in the house for the Saturday, February 8 performance. Also that evening, all UC Berkeley student ticketholders and their guests are invited to attend a reception with light refreshments on the mezzanine level at Zellerbach Hall immediately following the performance. Choreographer Twyla Tharp celebrates 60 years of crafting strikingly original, accessible, and uncategorizable works with a new collaboration with composer Philip Glass, the artists' first partnership in nearly 40 years. In close collaboration with Tharp, Third Coast Percussion has arranged Glass' hypnotic 1993–99 score *Aguas da Amazonia*, which the musicians perform live on a collection of custom-designed percussion instruments. Flutist Constance Volk joins them performing Glass' music that reflects on the crisis of climate change. Tharp also revives *Diabelli*, her 1998 triumph that challenges 11 dancers and pianist Vladimir Rumyantsev (performing live) to embody Beethoven's *Diabelli Variations*.
