THE <u>MASTERS OF PERSIAN MUSIC</u> BRING THREE GENERATIONS OF MUSICAL HERITAGE TO CAL PERFORMANCES ON

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 13 AT 8:00 P.M. IN ZELLERBACH HALL

BERKELEY, December 21, 2009—The Masters of Persian Music return to Cal

Performances on Saturday, February 13 at 8:00 p.m. in Zellerbach Hall. The program of

traditional Persian music is set to medieval mystic poetry and features two of Iran's most

prominent figures in Persian classical music, tar (plucked lute) master Hossein Alizadeh and

kamancheh (spiked fiddle) virtuoso **Kayhan Kalhor**. The ensemble will also include the highly

praised young vocalist Hamid Reza Nourbakhsh, trained by Iran's famed Mohammad Reza

Shajarian; this is Nourbakhsh's first tour of North America. The other members of the

ensemble include Fariborz Azizi (bass tar), Siamak Jahangiry (nay), Pezhham Akhavass

(tombak) and Rouzbeh Rahimi (santur).

A *Sightlines* pre-performance talk will be given by Judah L. Magnes Museum's Director

of Research, Francesco Spagnolo, on Saturday, February 13, from 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. at

Zellerbach Hall. This event is free to ticket holders.

Teacher, composer, conductor, arranger and master of the tar and setar Hossein

Alizadeh was born in Tehran in 1951. He studied at the School of Music at the University of

Tehran, earning his bachelor's degree in 1975. While pursuing his formal education, he also

studied radif with such masters as Houshang Zarif, Ali Akbar Shahnazi and Yousef Foroutan.

Upon the completion of his studies, he became the conductor, setar and tar soloist for the Iranian

National Orchestra of Radio and Television. In the 1980s, he furthered his musical education by

studying composition and musicology at the University of Berlin.

In 2000, the Iranian Ministry of Culture declared him the foremost contemporary artist. As

a teacher, he has trained many young musicians and has written and published a number of

etudes for tar and setar. He has composed many groundbreaking works of contemporary and

-MORE-

neo-classical Iranian music and recorded the entire body of the *radif*, based on the interpretation of Mirza Abdollah. Alizadeh performs extensively throughout the United States, Europe and Asia and has appeared on many radio and television programs around the world. He has taught at the University of Tehran, the Tehran Music Conservatory and the California Institute of the Arts.

Kayhan Kalhor is a virtuoso on the *kamancheh*. Kalhor, well-known for his performances with Yo-Yo Ma's *Silk Road* Project, was born in Tehran in 1963 and began his musical studies at age seven. A child prodigy, he was invited at age 13 to work with the Iranian National Orchestra of Radio and Television, where he performed for five years. At 17, Kalhor began playing with the most prestigious arts organization in Iran while continuing to study *radif* with a variety of masters. In his extensive travels throughout Iran, Kalhor learned and incorporated the musical traditions of different regions including Khorasan and Kurdistan, into his own music. He later studied Western classical music in Rome, Italy and Ottawa, Canada. He has composed for some of Iran's best-known performers as well as for the Kronos Quartet and Yo-Yo Ma. Kalhor has toured the world as a soloist and with ensembles performing Persian and Indian improvisations. *The New York Times* called him "a fiery improviser who moves from sighing, songful lines to fiercely percussive pizzicato fusillades and swirling arpeggios."

Hamid Reza Nourbakhsh studied music under the guidance, and was the leading disciple, of the master of classical Persian singing, Mohammad Reza Shajarian. He has performed with such renowned ensembles as the Shams and Aref as well as the Ukraine Philharmonic Orchestra. Regarded as one of the finest Iranian vocalists of his generation, Nourbakhsh is touring North America for the first time.
