BERKELEY, March 17, 2009—Quatuor Mosaïques, one of the most prominent period-instrument quartets of the day, will perform at the **First Congregational Church** on **Wednesday, April 22 at 8:00 p.m.** Members **Erich Höbarth** (violin), **Andrea Bischof** (violin), **Anita Mittere** (viola) and **Christophe Coin** (cello) have garnered praise for the unique sound of their gut-stringed instruments. In Berkeley, the ensemble's "boldly expressive" (*The New York Times*) quality and atypical use of original period instruments will be put to use in a program of **Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart**'s String Quartet in C major, K. 465, nicknamed "Dissonance"; and **Franz Schubert**'s *Quartettsatz* (Movement for the String Quartet) in C minor along with his String Quartet in D minor, more popularly known as, the "Death and the Maiden" quartet. "Quartet playing does not come any more eloquent or richly imagined than this" (*Daily Telegraph*, London).

A <u>Sightlines</u> pre-performance talk by Nicholas Mathew, UC Berkeley Department of Music, will take place on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>April 22 at 7:00 p.m.</u> at First Congregational Church, Berkeley. *Sightlines* talks are free to ticketholders.

The quartet's four members met in the 1980s while performing with Nikolaus Harnoncourt's Concentus Musicus. By 1985, Höbarth, Bischof, Mittere and Coin made the decision to perform on original period instruments as a classical "caper quartet," forming the now known as Quatuor Mosaïques. Since its inception, the ensemble has been celebrated for its atypical choice to perform on gut-stringed instruments and its constantly evolving repertoire, which elicited an invitation to perform for King Juan Carlos I of Spain, using his personal collection of Stradivari instruments. Its extensive discography includes the works of Haydn,

Mozart, Arriaga, Boccherini, Jadin, Beethoven, Schubert and Mendelssohn, as well as compositions by modern composers.

Along with its substantial discography, the quartet has toured extensively and won numerous prizes. Recognized around the world, Quatuor Mosaïques has performed across Europe and in the United States, Australia and Japan. The ensemble is a regular guest at such prestigious European festivals as Edinburgh, Salzburg and Oslo. Quatuor Mosaïques has collaborated with numerous international artists in performances, including such notables as András Schiff, Patrick Cohen, Wolfgang Meyer, Sabine Meyer and Miklós Perényi. Recordings of the *Wiener Klassik* repertoire, which comprises works by Haydn and Mozart, have won several awards, including France's *Diapason d'Or* and a *Gramophone* award.
