LEARN HOW TO BE GOOD WITH <u>RANDY COHEN</u>, COLUMNIST FOR THE NEW YORK TIMES' FEATURE, "THE ETHICIST" SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 19 AT 8:00 P.M. AT CAL PERFORMANCES

BERKELEY, October 19, 2005 – **Randy Cohen**, author of "The Ethicist," the weekly column and reader favorite in the Sunday *New York Times Magazine*, will offer a general approach to everyday ethics in his evening titled *How to be Good* on **Saturday**, **November 19** at **8:00 p.m**. in Zellerbach Hall. As an ethicist, he tackles pesky moral questions like is it acceptable to smuggle food into a movie theater or use a stray wi-fi connection. Cohen is the author of *The Good, The Bad and The Difference*, a collection of his advice, and is a multiple Emmy Award-winner for his comedy writing. His "Ethicist" column is syndicated in 38 papers across the United States and Canada. "One of the things I try to do in the column is discuss a course of action that someone is considering, and not to judge the person. That's not my job. I'm not deciding who gets into heaven," Cohen explains. Following his talk, Cohen will field questions from the audiences related to their own ethical dilemmas.

Randy Cohen was born in Charleston, South Carolina. He attended graduate school at the California Institute of the Arts as a music major studying composition, something Cohen says he is unable to account for. His first professional work was writing humor pieces, essays and stories for newspapers and magazines such as *The New Yorker*, *Harpers*, *The Atlantic Monthly*, *The Nation*, and *Young Love Comics*. Knopf published a collection of these pieces titled *Diary of a Flying Man* in 1989. For several years, he wrote "The News Quiz," a regular column of topical comedy, for the on-line magazine *Slate*.

Cohen's first television work was writing for *Late Night With David Letterman* for which he won three Emmy awards. His fourth Emmy was for his work on Michael Moore's *TV Nation*. He received a fifth Emmy as a result of a clerical error, and he kept it, he claims. He was the original head writer on the *The Rosie O'Donnell Show* for which he also co-wrote the theme music. Cohen is also a regular contributor to *Weekend All Things Considered* on National Public Radio. The Good, The Bad and The Difference was recently published in paperback by Broadway Publishing.
