CAL PERFORMANCES PRESENTS EGYPTIAN POLITICAL SATIRIST BASSEM YOUSSEF WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 29 AT 8:00 P.M. IN ZELLERBACH HALL

This Berkeley Talks event is in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Free Speech Movement.

BERKELEY, September 16, 2014—Named to *TIME* magazine's list of the "100 Most Influential People in the World" (2013), **Bassem Youssef**, "the Jon Stewart of Egypt," will take part in a conversation with UC Berkeley Chancellor **Nicholas B. Dirks** on Wednesday, October 29 at 8:00 p.m. in Zellerbach Hall. A cardiac surgeon-turned-political satirist, Youssef became a television personality as the host of Al-Bernameg ("The Show"), which began in 2011 as a series of five-minute YouTube segments. It later became the most watched show in the history of Egyptian television, averaging 40 million viewers each week. As a result of his bold criticism, an arrest warrant was issued for Youssef in March 2013, accusing him of insulting Islam and Egyptian President Mohamed Morsi, and for disrupting public order and peace. In October 2013, Capital Broadcast Center (CBC), the broadcasting network of Al-Bernameg, ceased airing the show on its channels. This Berkeley Talks event will commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Free Speech Movement by continuing to foster dialogue around the modern issues of free speech in times of revolution.

author <u>David Sedaris</u> on Saturday, November 15 at 8:00 p.m. in Zellerbach Hall, and cellist <u>Yo-Yo Ma</u> on Wednesday, December 10 at 8:00 p.m. in Zellerbach Hall.

Bassem Youssef was inspired to create his first program, "The B+ Show," on YouTube in response to the 2011 Arab Spring uprisings. The show quickly gained five million views in only three months, and led to an offer from Egyptian television network ONTV to create a weekly political satire television program called "Al-Bernameg" in 2011. Modeled after Jon Stewart's "The Daily Show,"Al-Bernameg was the first show of its kind in the Middle East and the first to include a live audience. By 2013, Youssef's YouTube channel had more than two million subscribers and 184 million total views, growing tremendously through the show's humorous yet bold criticism of Egyptian President Mohamed Morsi. Following his arrest in March 2013, Youssef took a break from Al-Bernameg. He returned to the air in October 2013 with a show that stirred significant controversy, prompting CBC to remove the program from its channels. Meanwhile, more than 120 complaints were filed at the General Prosecutor's office, accusing Youssef of insulting the Armed Forces and Acting President Adly Mansour, and for describing the June 30 revolution as a military coup. The General Prosecutor's investigation continues today. In June 2014, Youssef announced he will end Al-Bernameg due to pressure on both the show and the airing channel, and out of fear for his family's safety.
