BERKELEY, September 1, 2011—Cal Performances kicks off its 2011-12 season on **Sunday, September 25** with its second annual **Fall Free for All**, a full day of free, high quality music, dance and theater performances on the University of California, Berkeley, campus. With more than 12,000 people attending last year's inaugural event and every performance filled to capacity, and in response to the public's enjoyment of a diverse array of performances and activities, Cal Performances has expanded the number of family, theater, dance, jazz, world and classical music offerings and added performance stages for this year.

Glee's Jane Lynch has recently been added to the roster of artists participating in the event. Lynch will read from her new book *Happy Accidents*. She joins more than two dozen companies including: New Century Chamber Orchestra with violinist Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg; CK Ladzepko West African Music and Dance; pianist Sarah Cahill; American Bach Soloists with soprano Christine Brandes; BATS Improv; Fratello Marionettes; Los Cenzontles Mexican American Roots Music and Dance; Pi Clowns; Danse Lumiere; Melanie DeMore; Berkeley Symphony Wind Ensemble; San Francisco Opera Adler Fellow Ryan Belongie; Wayne Wallace Latin Jazz Quintet; Kitka; and AXIS Dance Company; plus

UCB Student Musical Activities vocal and jazz instrumental ensembles including the Cal Band; Gamelan Sari Raras from the UCB Department of Music and dance students from Theater Dance & Performance Studies.

The 45-minute performances are scheduled from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. indoors and outside throughout the campus, at Zellerbach, Wheeler and Hertz halls, Pauley Ballroom, Lower Sproul Plaza, Sather Gate, the Faculty Glade and the Eucalyptus Grove. The day includes CD signings, a community sing and an instrument petting zoo. The UC campus is easily accessible by BART and AC Transit, and the Fall Free for All is an opportunity to enjoy the performing arts amid the striking architecture and park-like atmosphere of the University. The Fall Free for All also offers a preview of the broad range of performing artists, residencies, and collaborations audiences can expect to experience throughout Cal Performances' 2011-12 season.

All of the Fall Free for All events are appropriate for a wide range of audiences from families with young children to seasoned arts aficionados. Some events are especially well-suited for families with children, including the **Pi Clowns**, **Fratello Marionettes**, **Los Cenzontles Mexican American Roots Music and Dance** and **Melanie DeMore's** community sing, an audience favorite last year. The **Berkeley Symphony Wind Ensemble**, a group of 13 woodwind and brass players from will perform Mozart's Serenade No. 10, K. 361, a work that is accessible to audiences both familiar with and new to orchestral music. The highly popular instrument petting zoo, also a favorite of families, will be expanded and located in Stephen's Lounge, next to Pauley Ballroom in the Martin Luther King Jr. Student Center.

Additional Fall Free for All festivities will be centered on Lower Sproul Plaza. Festivalgoers will have the opportunity to talk with many of the artists and get CDs signed. A variety of vendors will be on hand selling food and soft drinks to patrons. Tables will be located inside the tent and around lower Sproul Plaza so patrons will be able to take a break from the excitement and refuel before heading off to another event. ZELLERBACH HALL

Fall Free for All will commence with an 11:00 a.m. concert at **Zellerbach Hall** by San Francisco's **New Century Chamber Orchestra** (ncco.org) with internationally-acclaimed violin soloist **Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg** who has served as music director of the NCCO since 2008. The program will draw from their repertoire of classics from the past as well as works from other genres such as jazz and rock. **AXIS Dance Company** (axisdance.org) follows at 1:00 p.m. The Oakland-based troupe provides a unique forum for dancers with and without disabilities and of all ages and levels of dance. Showcasing Africa's rich cultural heritage, **CK Ladzekpo West**

African Music and Dance (home.comcast.net/~dzinyaladzekpo/) will leap onto the stage at 3:00 p.m. The company was founded in Oakland in 1974 by CK Ladzekpo from Ghana, West Africa, and is closely associated with the development of the Pan-African consciousness of African Americans in the United States. The final performance at Zellerbach Hall will be the Berkeley Symphony Wind Ensemble performing Mozart's Serenade No. 10, K. 361 at 5:00 p.m.

HERTZ HALL

Four performances will take place at Hertz Hall, beginning with *Pensive Spring: A* Portrait of Emily Dickenson at 11:00 a.m., conceived and choreographed by Kathryn Roszak. Featuring soprano Kristin Clayton, dancer Hally Bellah-Guther, pianist Kristin Pankonin and Ms. Roszak, the work is a series of vignettes illuminating the life of the poet based on her letters and poetry, set to music from Gordon Getty's song-cycle The White Election. At 1:00 p.m., the San Francisco Opera Adler Fellows (sfopera.com) program will perform. Founded in 1977 and dedicated to the musical training of gifted young singers, the Adler Fellows program will feature countertenor Ryan Belongie with an accompanist. American Bach Soloists (americanbach.org), founded in 1989 with the mission of introducing contemporary audiences to the cantatas of Johann Sebastian Bach through historically informed performances, will be led by co-founder and music director **Jeffrey Thomas**. The group's 3:00 p.m. concert includes Bach's "Non sa che sia dolore;" Air from Orchestral Suite No. 3 in D major, and Orchestral Suite No. 2 in B minor, and features soprano Christine Brandes. The "fiercely gifted" (The New York Times) composer and pianist Sarah Cahill (sarahcahill.com) will close the Hertz Hall performances at 5:00 p.m. with a program titled *The Mystical Tone* featuring music by Alexander Scriabin, Dane Rudhyar, Ruth Crawford and Erik Satie.

WHEELER AUDITORIUM

The students of the **UC Jazz Ensemble** (ucjazz.berkeley.edu) open the **Wheeler Auditorium** performances with a mixed jazz style concert at 12:00 p.m. that includes original compositions and jazz classics. Led by Director Ted Moore, UC Jazz is one of three groups, along with the Cal Band and UC Choral Ensembles, that comprises Student Musical Activities (SMA), the campus unit of extramural musical groups. At 2:00 p.m., **Kitka** (kitka.org), a vocal arts ensemble inspired by Balkan, Slavic and Caucasian women's vocal traditions will perform

Harmonies from Eastern Europe and Beyond. Kitka strives to expand the boundaries of folk song as a living, evolving art form. At 4:00 p.m., Fratello Marionettes (fratellomarionettes.com) will perform Carnival of the Animals, set to Camille Saint-Saens' score as the backdrop for three classic fables: "The Three Little Pigs," "The Tortoise and the Hare" and "The Ugly Duckling." The company's cabaret style—puppets and puppeteers performing in full view of the audience—showcases their intricately handcrafted marionettes.

PAULEY BALLROOM

Pauley Ballroom will host activities for all ages and of special interest to families. At 11:00 a.m., members of Los Cenzontles Mexican Roots Music and Dance will perform. Founded in San Pablo, California in 1994 by musician and educator Eugene Rodriguez, Los Cenzontles is an artist-driven organization committed to celebrating and increasing the appreciation of Mexican culture through classes, events, media and performances. At 1:00 p.m. the stage will be commandeered by the Pi Clowns, a physical comedy troupe devoted to exploring the world and examining life's mysteries using elements of clowning and mime technique, acrobatics, juggling, eccentric dance, live music, improvisation, puppetry and feats of incredible strength. The troupe was founded in 2004 at the University of California at Santa Cruz. At 2:30 p.m., actress and writer **Jane Lynch**, star of television's music rich comedy *Glee* will read from her new book *Happy Accidents*; this event is co-presented with the Cal Student Book Store. Conductor/singer/musician Melanie DeMore (melaniedemore.com) returns to Fall Free for All at 5:00 p.m. to lead a community sing and teach the basics of Gullah stick pounding. The Gullah are African Americans who live in the coastal plains and the Sea Islands regions of South Carolina and Georgia where slaves brought remnants of West and Central African cultures, including stick pounding as a means of communication. Rhythms will be combined with civil rights songs, spirituals, and other music of change. A founding member of the Cultural Heritage Choir and the California Artist in Residence with the Oakland Youth Chorus for ten years, DeMore is a Cal Performances teaching artist who regularly lead Cal Performances in the Classroom professional development workshops for teachers.

LOWER SPROUL PLAZA

A stage within a tent on **Lower Sproul Plaza** will be the site of three performances beginning at 12:00 noon with the award-winning **BATS Improv** (improv.org/Home.aspx), the largest and longest-running improvisation theater and school in Northern California. BATS—an acronym for "Bay Area Theater Sports"—will split into two teams, improvising scenes, songs and games based on audience suggestions. Five-time Grammy Award nominee and **trombonist Wayne Wallace** brings his **Latin Jazz Quintet** to the tent for an afternoon of Afro-Latin music at 2:00 p.m. An accomplished arranger, educator and composer, Wallace explores the intersections of diverse cultural styles through his performances, recordings and studies with masters of Afro-Latin and Jazz idioms such as Aretha Franklin, Bobby Hutcherson, Earth Wind and Fire and Santana. The **UC Jazz Faculty Ensemble** closes the afternoon at 4:00 p.m. with a mix repertoire program crossing a wide path of jazz currents from standards to originals. The ensemble is composed of six UC Jazz instructors, featuring drummer **Ted Moore**, Director of UC Jazz; **Dann Zinn**, sax; **Steve Campos**, trumpet; **Marty Wehner**, trombone; **Frank Martin**, piano; and **Glenn Richmann**, bass.

OTHER CAMPUS LOCATIONS

Performances will take place at a number of outdoors locations. Javanese musician and dhalang (shadow play performer) Midiyanto will lead **Gamelan Sari Raras** in a program of musical traditions of Central Java at <u>noon</u> at the **Faculty Glade**. Students from the department of **Theater, Dance and Performance Studies** will perform excerpts from original works led by Professor **Lisa Wymore** at **10:50 a.m.**, **12:50 p.m.**, **3:50 p.m.** and **5:10 p.m.** at the **Eucalyptus Grove** in the UC Berkeley campus.

Throughout the day at Sather Gate, Hertz Hall patio and in front of Wheeler and Zellerbach halls, SMA's choral ensembles, including the Men's Octet, California Golden Overtones, Perfect Fifth, Noteworthy, Cal Jazz Choir, and the University Chorus, as well as the Cal Band, will serenade festival-goers al fresco.
