<u>PEKING ACROBATS</u> LEAP INTO ZELLERBACH HALL FRIDAY- SATURDAY, JANUARY 20-22

SchoolTime: One-hour Performances for Bay Area students will be given Monday & Tuesday, January 23 & 24 2012

Zellerbach Hall on **Friday-Sunday**, **Janurary 20-22** with three performances that "passed from the seemingly impossible to the virtually unbelievable" (*Los Angeles Times*). Led by director **Hai Ken Tsai**, the audience will witness an awe-inspiring array of treacherous wire-walking, trick-cycling, precision tumbling, somersaulting, and gymnastics. Hailing from China, this elite group of gymnast, jugglers, cyclist, tumblers and musicians is consider one of the top practitioners of the ancient art of Chinese acrobatics and has been delighting audiences at home and abroad for decades with their thrilling performances. They will be accompanied by the **Women's Peace Orchestra of China** who will play the traditional Chinese instruments such as the *erhu* (a small bowed instrument with two strings), *pipa* (a string instrument similar to a lute), *dizi* (a flute made of bamboo) and the *yangquin* (a dulcimer played with bamboo mallets). Vibrant customs and strong production values complete this family friendly event.

Three one-hour *SchoolTime* performances for Bay Area K–12 students will feature select acts from the Peking Acrobats on **Monday**, **January 23** at **11:00 a.m.** & **1:00 p.m.** and **Tuesday**, **January 24** at **11:00 a.m.** in **Zellerbach Hall**. Tickets are \$5.00 and must be arranged in advance; for further information, please call 510.642.9988.

The Peking Acrobats have been diplomats of their spirited culture since 1952. At age five, the hand-selected performers begin training in master acrobatic disciplines that were developed more than 2,200 years ago during the Ch'in Dynasty (221–207 BCE). Schools are often located far from home. Originally, acrobatics were only practiced among the peasants and on the streets. It was not until the Han Dynasty (207 BCE–220 CE) that acrobatics flourished and a wide variety of juggling, tumbling and magic acts came to be known as the "Hundred

Entertainments." Emperor Wu Di of the Han Dynasty presented the first grand acrobatic performance at the Imperial Court, thus making it an important element in Chinese performing arts. Chosen from a selective process, acrobats are given high status and honor in China.

The Peking Acrobats' widespread international appeal has led to acclaimed performances in the United States, such as the 2003 Hollywood Bowl Fireworks Season Finale with the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra. Since their orchestral debut, the Peking Acrobats have performed with some of the most prestigious symphony orchestras in North America, including the Atlanta Symphony, the San Diego Symphony, the Buffalo Philharmonic, the San Francisco Symphony and the Ravinia Festival Orchestra, featuring members of the Chicago Symphony.

The troupe's mastery has led to numerous television and film appearances, including *The Wayne Brady Show*, *That's Incredible*, ABC's *Wide World of Sports*, NBC's *Ring in the New Year Holiday Special*, Nickelodeon's *Unfabulous* and Fox's *Guinness Book Primetime TV* (where they set the world record for on the height of the human chair stack where 6 members sat precariously on a stack of chairs 21 ft high in the air). Company member Shaobo Qinwas featured in Stephen Soderbergh's hit *Ocean's 11* series. They have also released 2 recording of their acts, the first in 2006.

The Peking Acrobats continuously tour and expanded international fame. In recent years they have made multiple trips in Europe including concerts in Italy, Belgium, Netherlands and Switzerland. In 2011 the Peking Acrobats are collaborating with the Canadian Edmonton Symphony Orchestra and Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, extending their North American Influence.
