# CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS ALVIN AILEY AMERICAN DANCE THEATER TUESDAY-SUNDAY, MARCH 29 – APRIL 3 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

CELEBRATING 10 YEARS OF ROBERT BATTLE'S ARTISTIC LEADERSHIP AND FEATURING SEVEN OF HIS WORKS, INCLUDING THE BAY AREA PREMIERE OF FOR FOUR.

RESIDENCY FEATURES THE WEST COAST STAGED PREMIERE OF JAMAR ROBERTS' HOLDING SPACE, A CAL PERFORMANCES CO-COMMISSION

This summer Cal Performances marks 20 years of Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp

Berkeley, February 25, 2022 — Cal Performances at UC Berkeley welcomes the return of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater—in person at Zellerbach Hall for the first time in two years—in a diverse repertory of more than two dozen works, including premieres, new productions, and Ailey classics, from Tuesday, March 29 through Sunday, April 3. The company, now in its seventh decade, has been performing regularly on the UC Berkeley campus for more than half a century—appearing at Zellerbach Hall more than any other place in the world outside of their home base in New York City.

This season's residency features seven performances made up of five distinct programs presented over the course of five days. This year the company celebrates Artistic Director **Robert Battle**'s decade of leading the Ailey dancers, where he has continued the work of founder Alvin Ailey through focusing on the importance of artistic excellence, unbounded creativity, and the power of art to transform and engage. Highlights of the company's five Berkeley programs include a *Robert Battle 10th Anniversary* program; the Bay Area premiere of Battle's *For Four*, and the West Coast staged premiere of *Holding Space* by Ailey Resident Choreographer **Jamar Roberts**, a Cal Performances' co-commissioned work given its streaming world premiere as part of last year's *Cal Performances at Home* online series. Other highlights of the engagement include the return of hip-hop innovator **Rennie Harris**' *Lazarus*; and an *All Ailey* program celebrating 50 years of *Cry*, Ailey's legendary solo dance; and featuring a new 2021 production of the Duke Ellington-inspired *Pas de Duke*.

Program A, a Robert Battle 10th Anniversary celebration, is performed Tuesday, March 29 at 7:30pm and Friday, April 1 at 8pm, and features seven works by Battle that span more than 20 years of his artistic output. For Four, in its Bay Area premiere, captures the energy of a world forced to live in isolation during the pandemic, and is set to a Wynton Marsalis jazz score. The work was created on video last year and is now presented for the first time for in-person company performances. The earliest Battle works in the program are Takademe (1999), a percussive, fast-paced dance that deconstructs the tightly woven rhythms of Indian kathak with a score by Sheila Chandra; the finale to the ballet Love Stories (2004), danced to songs by Stevie Wonder; and the ensemble work Mass (2004), with a score by composer John Mackey. The duet Unfold (2007) is presented in a new production, set to a recording of Leontyne Price singing Gustave Charpentier's aria "Depuis le Jour." Ella (2008) showcases the voice of its namesake, Ella Fitzgerald. The solo In/Side (2008) is set

to Nina Simone's performance of the song "Wild is the Wind." Alvin Ailey's masterpiece Revelations, which has inspired generations through its powerful storytelling set to American spirituals since its creation in 1960, closes the evening.

Program B, performed Wednesday, March 30 at 7:30pm and Saturday, April 2 at 8pm, pairs Revelations with hip-hop innovator Rennie Harris' Lazarus (2018), a two-act ballet inspired by Alvin Ailey's life and legacy. Set to a soundtrack produced by Darrin Ross, with his original music, and featuring the voices of Nina Simone, Terrence Trent D'Arby, Michael Kiwanuka, and Odetta. The creation of Lazarus is featured in the AILEY documentary currently streaming on Hulu and PBS Passport. Director Jamila Wignot's film explores the life of the visionary who changed American dance and culture and his legacy which continues today in the performances of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.

Program C, performed Thursday, March 31 at 7:30pm, features the West Coast in-person premiere of Ailey Resident Choreographer Jamar Roberts' *Holding Space*, which examines the ways in which we can collectively heal and nurture each other in a time of unprecedented upheaval. *Holding Space* features an original score by composer Tim Hecker, and distinctive lighting design. Like Battle's *For Four*, it was created on video during the pandemic and is having its first in-person performances this season. The program rounds out with Aszure Barton's layered, intricate *BUSK* (2009) and Alvin Ailey's *Reflections in D* (1962), a solo performance highlighting the grace of the male dancer moving to Duke Ellington's composition.

The *All Ailey* Program D, performed Saturday, April 2 at 2pm, features cherished Ailey classics, including a new production of *Pas de Duke* (1976), another one of the many ballets Ailey created to celebrate the musical genius of composer Duke Ellington. *Pas de Duke* was Ailey's modern dance translation of a classical *pas de deux* created for renowned dancers, Judith Jamison and Mikhail Baryshnikov. This season, the legendary solo *Cry* celebrates 50 years as an enduring Ailey masterpiece, a work he dedicated to "all Black women everywhere—especially our mothers." The 16-minute *tour-de-force* features music by Alice Coltrane, Laura Nyro, and the Voices of East Harlem, premiered in 1971. Ailey's *Blues Suite* (1958), created when the choreographer was just 27 years old, explores Ailey's "blood memories" of rural, Depression-era southern Texas. *Revelations* concludes this performance.

The 2022–23 Ailey engagement closes, on Sunday, April 3 at 3pm, with Program E featuring encore performances of works by two of the most in-demand choreographers of their generation—*BUSK* by Aszure Barton and *Holding Space* by Jamar Roberts, followed by the finale of Alvin Ailey's Revelations.

# Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp Turns 20

This summer, Cal Performances celebrates 20 years of producing Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp. A tuition-free, six-week summer program that promotes personal development through dance for middle school students, AileyCamp uses dance as a vehicle for developing self-esteem, self-discipline, creative expression, and critical thinking skills. Students from the Berkeley, Oakland, West Contra Costa, and Albany unified school districts participate in the full-scholarship program.

The camp, one of nine AileyCamps nationwide, was originally conceived by Alvin Ailey and is locally produced and fully funded by Cal Performances. AileyCamp was brought to the West Coast 20 years ago, when Ailey company alumnus David McCauley was tapped by Cal Performances to lead the program in Berkeley. McCauley led the camp until his retirement in 2020. In the 20 years since its launch, Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp has touched the lives of more than 1,000 young people in the Bay Area.

Cal Performances is marking the occasion of Berkeley/Oakland AileyCamp's 20th anniversary with an ambitious fundraising campaign designed to ensure that the camp will continue to provide even more young people with opportunities for personal discovery and growth through the power, beauty, and joy of dance.

Under the leadership of Robert Battle for the last decade, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater continues the work of founder Alvin Ailey through focusing on the importance of artistic excellence, unbounded creativity, and the power of art to transform and engage. Highlights of the company's five Berkeley programs over seven performances include a Robert Battle 10th Anniversary celebration; the Bay Area premiere of For Four by Robert Battle; and the West Coast in-person premiere of Holding Space by Ailey Resident Choreographer Jamar Roberts, a work given its world premiere as part of the Cal Performances at Home online streaming series in 2021; the return of hip-hop innovator Rennie Harris' Lazarus; and an All-Alvin Ailey program celebrating 50 years of Ailey's legendary Cry and featuring a new 2021 production of the Duke Ellington-inspired Pas de Duke.
