CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS A FEATURED PERFORMANCE OF THE 2023–24 SEASON ILLUMINATIONS: "INDIVIDUAL & COMMUNITY" SERIES

THE WEST COAST PREMIERE OF TAYLOR MAC & MATT RAY'S BARK OF MILLIONS A ROCK OPERA MEDITATION ON QUEERNESS FRIDAY–SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 23–25, 2024 AT ZELLERBACH HALL

Berkeley, CA, January 29, 2024, updated in red on February 12, 2024—Cal Performances presents the centerpiece of its 2023-24 season with the West Coast premiere performances of Taylor Mac and Matt Ray's *Bark of Millions*: A Parade Trance Extravaganza for the Living Library of the Deviant Theme on Friday–Saturday, February 23–24 at 7pm and Sunday, February 25 at 3pm at Zellerbach Hall. MacArthur Fellow, Kennedy Prize winner, and Pulitzer Prize finalist Taylor Mac and Obie Award-winning composer Matt Ray collaborate on this epic four-hour spectacle, which is part rock opera, part reimagined pride parade. Intended as both a celebration and a gift to the queer canon, the production features 55 original songs, one to mark each year since the first Gay Pride parade held in 1970, making it in Taylor's own words, "54 songs plus an extra as a cherry on top." Every song in this marathon production is inspired by a different queer person in history, spanning from ancient Egypt to leaders of the drag movement in America. (A story about five of them can be found on <u>Cal Performances' website</u>.) Through music, dance, and drag spectacle, the production subverts and deconstructs conventional narratives and joyfully, transgressively celebrates queerness in all its forms.

Co-directed by Niegel Smith and Faye Driscoll and featuring Machine Dazzle's signature maximalist costume design, *Bark of Millions* will be brought to life at Zellerbach Hall by an international ensemble of 22 artists, including: Ari Folman-Cohen, Bernice "Boom Boom" Brooks, Chris Giarmo, Dana Lyn, El Beh, Greg Glassman, Jack Fuller (Vocal Captain), Joel E. Mateo, Jules Skloot, Le Gateau Chocolat, Lisa "Paz" Parrott, Machine Dazzle, Mama Alto, Marika Hughes, Matt Ray, Sean Donovan (Associate Choreographer), Steffanie Christi'an, Stephen Quinn, Taylor Mac, Thornetta Davis, Viva DeConcini, and Wes Olivier. Mac and his artistic community are best known for his groundbreaking retelling of American history, *A 24-Decade History of Popular Music*, the subject of a <u>90-minute documentary</u>, now streaming on Max, that captures the marathon, 24-hour immersive concert that garnered Mac significant national and international acclaim.

Taylor Mac is known for cultivating a deeply collaborative ethos in his performance works, and has described his creative process as a series of "invitations" and "offerings" between artists involved in a project—as composers, lyricists, performers, designers, accompanists—and the audience. His desire is for the individuals contributing to his spectacles to retain and nourish their identities within the group performance setting. This translates to an inclusive and generous approach towards his audience as well, as Mac expects attendees to process his works on their own terms and discover connections and revelations rooted in their personal experience.

The performances of *Bark of Millions* are part of Cal Performances' *Illuminations*: "Individual & Community" programming for the 2023–24 season. *Illuminations* connects groundbreaking UC Berkeley scholarship to themes addressed by the world-class music, dance, and theater presented by Cal Performances. The series includes performances, panel discussions, lecture demonstrations, Q&As, and more, shedding light on pressing topics that have the power to transform our understanding of the world and shape the future. This season's theme, "Individual & Community," explores the tensions that come into play while balancing the interests of the individual with those of the group.

"We didn't know what this show would be when we invited Taylor Mac," says Jeremy Geffen, executive and artistic director of Cal Performances. "But it seemed like the perfect opportunity to introduce the theme this season of 'Individual and Community,' which is very much of the moment and informs our national and international dialogue." *Illuminations* programming in general, he adds, "was created as a way to reflect on pressing issues of our time through the performing arts, which invite us to become empathetic: you're quite literally seeing the world through someone else's eyes. The direct, emotive connection that comes through the performing arts is a powerful tool."

Mac has said, "What we are trying to do with this show is explore queer sexuality without heterosexuality dictating what that is ... without any kind of cis or dominant culture leading us. And it's all done through singing songs. I make work for queer people, and if the straight people want to come, please do!... We will make you queer by the end of the evening. And we don't really even do it. You do it. You do all the work yourself. All we do is sing songs."

To provide context for *Bark of Millions* and other *Illuminations*: "Individual and Community" programming, Cal Performances produced <u>a video</u> featuring UC Berkeley faculty and scholars, and visiting artists, including Mac, exploring the concept of intersectionality as a framework for understanding how individuals' identities result in unique combinations of discrimination and privilege. Mac explains, "We live in a culture that asks us to reduce ourselves to one thing. Usually, when we go to see work that has a community aspect to it, it asks us to root for one team—like a sporting game or one god in church. Art can break up the concept of homogeneity. It can complicate things." Mac's ideas are also featured in a second Cal Performances' *Illuminations* video about individual liberties and community needs, which he says, "It all comes from a concept that my drag mother gave me, which is like, if you're not having fun at the party, go make another party."

Taylor Mac, the MacArthur Fellow and Pulitzer Prize finalist, visits with the West Coast premiere of *Bark of Millions*, a "parade trance extravaganza." *Bark of Millions* is a four-hour rock opera meditation on queerness featuring 55 original songs (one song per year since the first Gay Pride parade) inspired

by queer antecedents throughout world history and performed by a diverse cast of 13 ensemble members and a band of 9 musicians. As in his legendary retelling of American history, *A 24-Decade History of Popular Music*, Mac, his cast, and longtime collaborators Matt Ray (music) and Machine Dazzle (costumes) use music, dance, and drag spectacle to subvert and deconstruct conventional narratives, and joyfully, transgressively celebrate queerness in all its forms.
