CAL PERFORMANCES AT UC BERKELEY PRESENTS

A FEATURED PERFORMANCE OF THE 2022–23 SEASON ILLUMINATIONS: "HUMAN AND MACHINE" SERIES VIRTUOSO KEYBOARDIST KRISTIAN BEZUIDENHOUT IN THE EVOLUTION OF THE FORTEPLANO AT HERTZ HALL, SUNDAY, OCTOBER 30

Berkeley, CA, September 26, 2022—Cal Performances at UC Berkeley welcomes internationally acclaimed keyboard artist Kristian Bezuidenhout in his Cal Performances debut on Sunday, October 30 at 3pm at Hertz Hall. In an artfully curated program that is the first *Illuminations* performance of the 2022–23 season, Bezuidenhout takes listeners on a historical journey through his instrument's evolution, moving chronologically through repertoire as he performs music by J.S. Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, Clara Schumann, and Mendelssohn on a harpsichord, rarely seen replicas of 18th- and 19th-century fortepianos, and an antique grand piano.

The recital is the first performance of this season's *Illuminations*: "Human and Machine" programming, a project that explores the roles technology and invention have played in catalyzing and challenging creative expression and human communication. In this recital, Bezuidenhout explores the theme by illuminating the relationships between invented musical instruments, the creative process of composers, and the interpretive capacities of performers throughout history.

He begins his recital performing J.S. Bach's Toccata in D minor, BWV 913 on a John Phillips harpsichord, and Mozart's Fantasia in C minor, K. 475 on a on a R.J. Regier copy of an Anton Walter pianoforte from the mid-1790s. On a Regier copy of a Conrad Graf pianoforte from the 1820s, Bezuidenhout then moves on to Beethoven's *Pathétique* Sonata in C minor, and two Schubert works: the Andantino from *Moments Musicaux*, D. 780, and the second movement, Allegretto quasi andantino, from the Sonata in A minor, D. 537. Finally, on an antique London Erard grand piano from 1854, he performs Clara Schumann's Romance in A minor and a sampling of music by Mendelssohn: selections from the composer's beloved *Songs without Words*; and the Three Fantasies or Caprices, Op. 16.

Though this is his first Cal Performances engagement, South African-born and London-based, Bezuidenhout brings with him a wealth of international experience and acclaim. He is an artistic director of the Freiburger Barockorchester and Principal Guest Director with The English Concert and is a regular guest with leading ensembles including Les Arts Florissants, the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Bezuidenhout has recorded the complete solo keyboard music of Mozart to critical acclaim.

A post-performance talk with Cal Performances' executive and artistic director Jeremy Geffen and Kristian Bezuidenhout will elaborate on Bezuidenhout's artistry as well as his relation to this season's *Illuminations* theme and is free to concert ticketholders.

Illuminations connects groundbreaking UC Berkeley scholarship to themes addressed by the world-class music, dance, and theater artists presented by Cal Performances. *Illuminations* programming—which includes performances, panel discussions, lecture demonstrations, Q&As, and more—sheds light on pressing topics with the power to transform our understanding of the world and shape the
