**Berkeley, February 6, 2023, updated March 2, 2023**—The University of California, Berkeley and Cal Performances announce today added events, updates, and ticket information for the campuswide residency by world-renowned, multidisciplinary artist William Kentridge that continues this spring. Dedicated to the work of one of the most respected artists of our time, the residency provides the UC Berkeley campus and wider Bay Area community the rare opportunity to engage directly with Kentridge and his artistry via lectures, performances, and events that showcase the breadth and depth of his creative output. ### Added Events

Announced today, soprano Joanna Dudley will star in the performance art piece she created with William Kentridge, *A Guided Tour of the Exhibition: For Soprano and Handbag* on Wednesday, March 15 at 7:30pm at Zellerbach Playhouse. The presentation combines live art, drama, film, and sculpture as Dudley conducts an immersive exhibition tour. In this undefinable performance piece, artworks are empowered to speak for themselves in direct defiance of museums' tendency to prescribe fixed meanings to and antiquate their subjects .

On Thursday, March 16, William Kentridge will join internationally renowned cross-disciplinary philosopher Judith Butler as part of Berkeley's Arts + Design Thursdays class for a conversation

entitled *Video Art and Social Intervention: Forms of Life.* In their discussion, which is part of a semesterlong series of lectures on <u>Video Art in Context</u>, the two will consider the relationship between art and politics, the paradoxes of identity, the ethics of activism, the power of "the less good idea," and much more. The talk will be available to view via livestream and a recording of it will be available following the event.

Following William Kentridge's residency, the Townsend Center for the Humanities will present *Reflections on William Kentridge* a conversation featuring a panel of UC Berkeley scholars reflecting on the art of William Kentridge in the Reading Room at BAMPFA. The event is for UC Berkeley students only and closed to the general public.

#### **Films Announced**

Also today, BAMPFA announces the details of its expansive retrospective, *Orchestrating Time: The Films of William Kentridge*, from March 9–April 2. BAMPFA's series showcases Kentridge's distinctive work in time-based media over six presentations and a gallery installation. Highlights include the 2010 documentary *William Kentridge: Anything is Possible*, paired with six short films (March 9); *Drawings for Projection*, a series of 11 animated films featuring two of Kentridge's characters, Soho Eckstein and Felix Teitelbaum, whom the artist describes as a "self-portrait in the third person" (March 11); an eclectic set of films relating to Kentridge's work for theater, opera, and gallery installation (March 25); and three filmed operas for which Kentridge worked as stage director, production designer, and/or set designer: Shostakovich's satirical opera *The Nose* (March 16), Alban Berg's *Lulu* (March 26), and Mozart's *The Magic Flute* (April 2), all offered at BAMPFA free of charge. In addition, from March 8–April 20, BAMPFA will exhibit Kentridge's video *Other Faces* (2011) in one of the galleries as part of the *Out of Africa: Selections from the Kramlich Collection*, an exhibition organized by BAMPFA staff and curated by Executive Director Julie Rodrigues Widholm with Associate Curator Elaine Yau. William Kentridge's SIBYL (music: Nhlanhla Mahlangu, Kyle Shepherd; US Premiere)

### Program:

Part 1: The Moment Has Gone Part 2: Waiting for the Sibyl

Myth, magic, music, movement, and imagery combine in South African visual artist William Kentridge's newest production. Presented in two parts, *SIBYL* is inspired by the Greek myth of the Cumaean Sibyl, and wrestles with the human desire to know our future, and our helplessness before powers and technologies that obscure that knowledge. The chamber opera *Waiting for the Sibyl* features nine vocalists and dancers interacting with Kentridge's distinctive stage design, which energizes the action of the performers through the use of hand-painted sets, animated ink drawings, swirling projected text, collage, and shadow play. The music in *SIBYL* is composed by Nhlanhla Mahlangu and Kyle Shepherd, and layers South African vocal harmonies with rhythmic chants and piano accompaniment. The first part of the program, *The Moment Has Gone*, is a film by Kentridge with live music featuring a piano score by Shepherd and an all-male vocal chorus led by Mahlangu.

A talk with William Kentridge and cast members follows the matinee performance on Sunday, March 19, free to all ticket holders.

This performance is part of Cal Performances' 2022–23 season *Illuminations*: "Human and Machine" themed programming.

## BAMPFA presents Out of Africa: Selections from the Kramlich Collection

William Kentridge's film *Other Faces* (2011) is featured in a selection of photographs and video installations on display at BAMPFA that is centered on the continent of Africa as a site of extraction, exploitation, and displacement for economic gain. The works on display date from the 1990s to 2013 and are primarily drawn from the Pamela and Richard Kramlich Collection; the Kramlichs have been pioneering collectors of video art since the late 1980s. The exhibition is organized by BAMPFA staff and curated by Executive Director Julie Rodrigues Widholm with Associate Curator Elaine Yau. William Kentridge: *Anything is Possible* Susan Sollins, Charles Atlas (US, 2010)

Rich in visual imagery and music, this documentary gives viewers an intimate look into the mind and process of Kentridge, whose acclaimed charcoal drawings, animations, video installations, shadow plays, mechanical puppets, tapestries, sculptures, live performance pieces, and operas have made him one of the most dynamic and exciting contemporary artists working today. Also included on this program are several of Kentridge's earliest films, two collaboratively made films, as well as *Journey to* 

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*the Moon,* inspired by the French filmmaker and master of cinematic invention, Georges Méliès. (2010, 53 mins, color, digital file, From Art21)

### Drawings for Projection

*Drawings for Projection* is a central project of Kentridge's impressive career. The animated series, which the artist has been working on for more than thirty years, is one he describes as a "self-portrait in the third person." The narrative thread follows two central characters, Soho Eckstein and Felix Teitelbaum, and deals with themes of memory, loss, cultural displacement, and political oppression. Kentridge works without a script and employs a hand-crafted animation technique. His distinctive use of charcoal, pastel, and ink features repeated augmentation and redrawing of primary images. About the process, Kentridge shares, "The smudges of erasure thicken time in the film, but they also serve as a record of the days and months spent making the film—a record of thinking in slow motion."

### Staged Opera The Nose Stage direction by William Kentridge (US, 2010/13)

William Kentridge directed and designed this visually dazzling Met premiere production of Dmitri Shostakovich's satirical opera, adapted from the classic short story by Nikolai Gogol. Baritone Paulo Szot leads the cast as Kovalyov, the hapless bureaucrat whose nose has mysteriously gone missing. Hailed for its creative stage direction, which resonates so perfectly with the avant-garde character of Shostakovich's work, Kentridge "succeeds in supplying a striking visual analogue to the brilliance of the music. But the genius of the production is that he also ensures that the story unfolds with remarkable lucidity" (George Loomis, *The Classical Review*).

Staged Opera Lulu Stage direction by William Kentridge, Luc de Wit (US, 2015) *Lulu*, one of the great operas of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, written by Alban Berg in the late 1920s and early 1930s, deals with themes of fragility, impossibility, and the fragmentation of desire. Kentridge's multi-layered production stars charismatic soprano Marlis Petersen in the title role—the enigmatic and alluring woman who is equal parts femme fatale, innocent, and victim. "Kentridge stands out in the world of theater projection, largely because he hand draws so many of his projections with variety, freshness, and genius . . . Most of the projections in *Lulu* use Kentridge's drawings done in German Expressionist style. Like Picasso and Matisse, Kentridge can knock off drawings in a variety of styles with an amazing facility" (Ann McCoy, *The Brooklyn Rail*).

### Short Films by Kentridge: Variations

This eclectic set of films relates in part to Kentridge's work for theater, opera, and gallery installation while displaying the importance of variations in his artistic practice. *Ubu Tells the Truth* uses handdrawn, cut out, and live action techniques and takes its inspiration from Alfred Jarry's Ubu Roi character from French theater circa 1896. (Kentridge worked with the Handspring Puppet Company on *Ubu and the Truth Commission*, which Bay Area audiences may remember seeing live at Cal Performances in 2015.) *Shadow Procession* and *Sibyl* reveal the artist's interest in fables and narratives related to South African and world history. *Anti-Mercator* connects thematically with the installation project *The Refusal of Time* and links to Kentridge's creative series of film flipbooks — several examples of this form are featured here, showcasing the artist's interest in language, science, collage, animation, and time.

Staged Opera The Magic Flute Stage direction William Kentridge (Italy, 2012)

(*Die Zauberflöte*). Kentridge's inspired direction of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's magnificent *The Magic Flute* originally premiered at Le Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie, Brussels, in 2005, and was later filmed for television at Teatro alla Scala in Milan. "The preliminary work on the drawings and animations for *Zauberflöte* were done in my studio in Johannesburg and tested on a model of the stage with wooden cutout figures... One of the main unanswered questions was how to find a good relationship between the live singers and the projected drawings, so that the projections are not just backdrops...and that the live performer and projection are not at odds." (Kentridge)

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## Conversation Reflections on William Kentridge

Following William Kentridge's campus-wide residency, a group of UC Berkeley scholars gathers to assess the artist's cultural, ideological, and formal contributions. The conversation takes as its

starting point Kentridge's installation Other Faces (2011), part of BAMPFA's exhibition Out of Africa: Selections from the Kramlich Collection (March 8 through April 30, 2023). Other Faces, which visualizes Kentridge's reflections on race and historical memory in South Africa, is part of a larger selection of photography and video art focusing on the theme of Africa as a site of colonial extraction and exploitation. Engaging with the installation, as well as with Kentridge's recent campus performances and film screenings, panelists consider the artist's complex vision and body of work.

### **Participants:**

Nana Adusei-Poku (History of Art) is a scholar of African diasporic art and the author of *Taking Stakes in the Unknown: Tracing Post-Black Art* (2022).

Lara Mientjes (English) studies the intersection of poetry and visual art. She focuses on the "how" of poetry and other media, exploring questions of attention, immersion, and imagination.

Zamansele Nsele (History of Art) is completing a book project entitled "Reckoning with (Post) Apartheid and Colonial Nostalgias in Contemporary Archival Art Practice."

Mary Ann Smart (Music) is editor of Siren Songs: Representations of Gender and Sexuality in Opera and author of Waiting for Verdi: Opera and Political Opinion in 19th-Century Italy, 1815-1848.
